IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—The Senate, on motion of Mr. Blair, resumed the consideration of the Education bill. The debate was continued at length by Messrs. Voorhees, Butler, Morgan, Jones, of Fla., and Vile. Mr. Hoar's first amendment was then taken up and read, providing that the amount to be distributed for the first year be \$7,000,000, the second year \$10,000,000, third year \$15,000,000, and should then be diminished at the rate of \$2,000,000 yearly until the expiration of the eighth year, when the appropriation shall cease. Agreed to—yeas 28, nays 12. Another amendment by Mr. Hoar was agreed to, providing that equal opportunities of education be given to all the children of a State. An amendment was offered by Mr. Sherman, providing that the money shall be used only for common schools, not sectarian in character. Agreed to. The first of the amendments heretofore offered by Mr. Harrison was then taken up. It provides that no State shall receive any of the benefits of the act until the Governor of the State shall file with the Secretary of the Interior an annual statement, showing the attendance at schools and expenditure for them. Upon this another protracted debate sprang up, and taking a political turn it continued far into the night.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

After a long debate and strong opposition, the House suspended the rules and made the bill for the erection of public buildings the continuing special order for April 9. Mr. Stokelger explained that the committee on Public Buildings had reported thirty bills which were on the public calendar and there were twenty-four Senate bills on the Speaker's table. The average appropriation of the House bills was \$112,000. Mr. Converse, of Ohio, secured the floor and moved to suspend the rules and pass the bill restoring the duty of 1867 on wool. A second being considered as order the thirty minutes debate allowed by the rules was begun. The motion was put and lost. Mr. Thompson, of Kentucky, moved to suspend the rules and adopt a resolution declaring it unwise and inexpedient for the present Congress to abolish or reduce the tax on spirits distilled from grain. In a brief debate which followed Mr. York and Mr. Cox, of N. C., opposed the motion and advocated the entire repeal of the internal revenue laws. The motion was agreed to and the House adjourned.

STATE NEWS.

Asheville Advance: Mr. H. A. Guder, of Marsville, has moved with his family to this city, where he has formed a law partnership with H. B. Carter. There were two lots of tobacco, in all about 1,700 pounds, sold at the Banner Warehouse Friday which averaged \$58 per hundred. Charlotte Observer: The revivals that have been in progress among the colored people of the city for about a month past are now about closed and the results are being reckoned up. Rev. R. S. Rives, of A. M. E. Zion Church, wins the laurels as the champion preacher, having secured an accession of three hundred and forty-five (345) new members, besides the profession of faith of two hundred and forty-four (244) others making 589 conversions in all. Rev. A. A. Powell, pastor of the 1st Baptist Church, reports one hundred and twenty three additions to his membership. Rev. Z. Haughton, of the Ebenezer Baptist church, reports a large number of new members, besides many new converts. The whole number of converts made in all the 900. Raleigh Visitor: Four persons joined Edenton Street M. E. Church yesterday morning—two of whom were baptized. There were about thirty penitents at the altar last night. Early yesterday morning crowds of people, both white and black, in every style of vehicle, from the omnibus down to the ox cart, on horseback and a good many walking, wended their way to "Taylor's Pond," two miles North of the city, to witness the baptism which we announced on Saturday. By 10 o'clock you could not hire or borrow a horse. The streets in the city were almost deserted. At precisely 10¹⁵ o'clock the ceremony began and was finished at 11¹⁵ o'clock. There were 156 candidates immersed, part being from the First Baptist Church, colored, and the others from the Baptist Church in East Raleigh. The crowd in attendance was variously estimated at from three to five thousand. Goldsboro Messenger: Dr. W. H. Milburn, the noted lecturer, was in the city on Friday, the guest of Mrs. H. F. Grainger. He left for Mount Olive Friday evening. Mr. John R. Smith, chairman of the Republican County Committee, has issued a call for township meetings to elect delegates to a county convention to be held on the 23d inst. Mr. J. B. Whitaker, of this city, in looking through some of his old papers last week, found the appointments of Messrs. H. G. Bonham and H. D. Paschal, as sergeants in the Mexican war, in which he was an adjutant general. Mr. Whitaker says he recollects now that those gentlemen left the certificates of their appointment with him for safe keeping while they were in service, and that they never called for them. Messrs. Bonham and Paschal are both dead, and he notifies the respective families of the deceased to come for these certificates, as they may be of service in obtaining pensions. LOCAL NEWS.

County Commissioners.

The Board met yesterday afternoon in regular monthly session. The Treasurer submitted his report for the month of March, as follows: General fund, balance on hand, \$19,924 55. Education fund, balance on hand, 17,117 42. Of the general fund the sum of \$6,665 is in the form of a certificate on deposit at the First National Bank.

The Treasurer exhibited 16 coupons of the denomination of \$3 each, and four coupons of the denomination of \$15 each, which were destroyed in the presence of the Board. The Register of Deeds submitted his report of fees, received for the marriage licenses during the month of March, and exhibited the Treasurer's receipt for \$7 60, and the same was ordered on file. On motion, an election was held for School District No. 5, under the local assessment act, and a levy of 10 cents on the \$100 valuation of real and personal property and 30 cents on the poll of all white tax payers was made. On motion, the sum of \$500 was appropriated by New Hanover county to the State Exposition. On motion, the following were appointed a committee to act in conjunction with the committee appointed at the meeting of the citizens held at the City Hall on the 3rd of April, as an Executive committee, to prepare articles for exhibition at the State Exposition, to be held at Raleigh in October next, and to see that our county is properly represented, viz: Don. MacRae, B. F. Hall and Clayton Giles. The following were appointed tax lists for the year 1884: Wilmington—J. G. Burr. Federal Point Township—J. H. Horne. Masonboro—B. S. Montford. Harnett—A. A. Mosely. Cape Fear—Iradell Johnson. The Board then proceeded to levy the usual schedule B and C taxes for 1884. The Board then adjourned.

The Board of Aldermen met in regular monthly session at the City Hall last night. The Finance Committee was granted time in the matter of advertising. The report of the Finance Committee on appropriations for the year was read. Alderman Boney moved that an appropriation of \$325 be made for the addition and painting of the Little Giant Engine Co's house. Adopted. A motion to appropriate \$1,000 for the Howard Fire Engine Co was lost. A motion that all repairs of buildings be charged to the department to which they belong, was adopted. Alderman Guyer moved that \$1,200, appropriated in the estimates for streets and wharves, be stricken out, and the appropriation be made for the south end of Third street. Lost. Alderman DeRosset moved to amend by adding Second and Orange streets. Adopted. A motion by Alderman Sweet, that the appropriation for the Superintendent of the street force be stricken out, was lost. Alderman Fishblade moved that the appropriation of \$1,000 for city surveyor be stricken out. Lost. Motions to amend by making the appropriation \$500 and \$600 were lost, when Alderman Guyer moved to make the appropriation \$1,000, which was carried. The eyes and noses were called as follows: Ayes—Aldermen DeRosset, Chaddourn, Sweat, Howe and Guyer. Nays—Aldermen Boney, Bear, Dudley and Fishblade. Alderman Boney moved to strike out the appropriation of \$720 for a paver, and that the amount be appropriated for Walnut, Mulberry and Second streets. Several amendments were made and lost, and the appropriation was then stricken out. A motion by Alderman DeRosset, that the appropriation be made \$500 and added to "incidental," was adopted. Alderman Guyer moved a reconsideration of the vote on the salary of the City Surveyor. Adopted. Alderman Fishblade moved that the appropriation be stricken out. Adopted. Alderman Dudley moved to amend the report of the Police Department by making the amount \$300 for the clerk. Adopted. A motion to amend the appropriation for the Fire Department by adding \$150 for the Little Columbia Reel Co., was referred to the committee on Fire Department. An ordinance was adopted authorizing the appointment of a Superintendent of Lights. The Board then adjourned to meet next Friday night at 8 o'clock.

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Sudden Death.

Miss Mary Ann Latimer, of Cromwell, Conn., died very suddenly at about 11 o'clock this forenoon, at the residence of her nephew, Mr. William Latimer, aged 78 years. Her brother, Mr. Henry G. Latimer, died at his home in Plainfield, N. J., on Sunday last, aged about 75 years, and it is supposed that this sad event hastened an attack of apoplexy, which terminated in her death. Mr. William Latimer and Mr. Henry G. Latimer, of this city, are absent in attendance upon the obsequies of their uncle in New Jersey, where they have probably ere this heard of the sad event which has transpired in the household of the former.

The Produce Exchange.

There was a meeting of the members of the Produce Exchange held to-day for the transaction of business and the election of officers for the ensuing year. Nothing was done, however, save the hearing of the reports of the President and Secretary. When these were concluded an election was held with the following result: President—Col. Roger Moore. Vice President—Mr. J. H. Currie. Board of Managers—Messrs. H. C. McQueen, B. F. Hall, A. H. Greene, J. D. Woody and R. W. Hicks. Inspectors of Elections—Messrs. J. M. Forshee, J. W. Bolles, and W. W. Harris. Adjourned.

The opera is put upon the stage in a manner that leaves nothing to be desired. The chorus is strong and sings the numbers with precision; the costumes are beautiful and harmonious, and not a little is added to the pleasure of the audience by the excellent music from a full orchestra. When the curtain fell upon the last act the verdict was that the performance was exceptionally fine.
