A thousand women attended an execution at Columbia, Kentucky, and one of them has since become crazy.

Gounod has completed a new work, an oratorio, which is entitled "Mors et Vita," and is a sequel to the "Redemption."

An English journalist says that if the emigration of young Irish couples to America continues the population of Ireland will eventually fall to three millions.

William Nowland, king of the Orkney gypsies, has just died at the age of 102, and his widow, aged over 90, was able to smoke a pipe vigorously during the funeral services.

Kentucky expects to raise this season the largest crop of tobacco ever grown in the State. The farmers find it a profitable crop, and the area devoted to it is rapidly extending.

A formation of tin and silver-bearing ore has been discovered three miles from Glenwood, in Mason County, West Virginia, which bids fair to prove of considerable richness and value.

Havana advices to New York, of April 12th, say that private accounts from Sagua report that an American vessel had been searched and her crew roughly treated by a Spanish cruiser.

The body of Geo Lea was found in White river, near Indianapolis, last Thursday. He wandered away from his son's house three weeks ago. He was 82 years old and the oldest locomotive engineer in America, having run the first engine on the Baltimore and Ohio railroad in 1832.

Philadelphia police have just destroyed the gamblers' and burglars' implements which have accumulated from capture in the last dozen years. There were silver dealing-boxes worth \$200 each, roulette wheels worth \$300, valuable packs of cards and chips and odds and ends, and a quantity of the finest burglars' tools—the whole worth \$2,000 to \$4,000.

Sir Wm. Harcourt, secretary of State for the Home Department, in a speech at Derby, on Wednesday evening last, said: The Government will dissolve Parliament at its own time, not at the time of the Conservatives. The Government went to Egypt reluctantly, and would have retired but for events in the Sudan. England has no right to annex Egypt. England has quite enough empire. If we annex Egypt we are liable to perpetual embroilment with other countries.

At a meeting of the Grand Council at New Orleans, on Wednesday night, all the mechanics belonging to unions employed in building were ordered to cease work until further notice. Here-tofore carpenters and other mechanics have continued work when paid three dollars per day, the wages demanded by the strikers, but the order indicates a change of policy. They want none but union men employed, and the strike is made general until the bosses come to terms.

A. E. Bateman, of the firm of Bateman & Co., bankers of Washington, has preferred charges against Brig.-Gen. D. G. Swaim, at the head of the bureau of military justice of the United States army, for fraud and for conduct unbecoming an officer and gentleman. He stands ready to prove, he says, that said D. G. Swaim has committed fraud to all intents and purposes upon the banking house of which he is a member. Judge Advocate Gen. Swaim denies the charges and says Bateman is trying to blackmail him.

A letter has been received from a gentleman in Utica, New York, who reports a recent conversation with Roscoe Conkling, in which the ex-Senator speaks in very friendly terms of James G. Blaine, and says that he would rather see him nominated than any other man who has been mentioned for the place. The attention of Mr. Blaine was called to the statement, and he said that it was not exactly a surprise to him, as he had heard an intimation of the kind before. It true Conkling must be of a more forgiving nature than we had given him credit for.

A New Enterprise.
A number of prominent colored men in this city have associated themselves together for the purpose of conducting here a business in real estate and in all kinds of produce and have taken out papers of incorporation under act of Legislature, with the title of the Cape Fear Enterprise Company. The incorporators are Joseph H. Willis, Frank P. Williston, James W. Telfair, Elijah Lane, Dallas Chesnut, William B. Hill, James C. Moore, Charles H. Ward, Lorenzo D. Kennedy and Joseph E. Sampson.

The officers of the company are Joseph H. Willis, President, James W. Telfair, Secretary, and Charles H. Ward, Treasurer. They have already purchased two lots, one at the foot of Mulberry street, fronting Nutt, and the other at the corner of Tenth and Castle, and expect to build at an early day.
