He had been on a flying visit from Washington to attend the Mecklenburg Celebration at Charlotte, and arrived here yesterday morning. While here he was the guest of Mr. William H. McRary. He will leave here to-night to resume his duties, in Congress at Washington. Kingsley, Secretary, Holy He has succeeded in securing an appropriation of \$100,000 for the erection of a public building in this city; \$75,000 for the improvement of the lower Cape Fear, and \$5,000 for the works on the upper Cape Fear. This last appropria- ties. tion would have been larger were it not for the fact that a large unexpended balance remained over from the amount appropriated last year He endeavored to obtain an appropriation for Black river, but as there had been no survey of that stream, he was not successful. He, however, obtained an order for the survey of that river and also an order for the ressurvey of the Northeast branch of the Cape Fear. Aside from the special appropriations we have named, a liberal amount wil be named in the general appropriation bill for improving the lights of the lower Cape Fear, and for improvements between New River, in Onslow

county, and the Sounds. Col. Green has also introduced a bil to abolish the internal revenue tax upon brandy distilled from fruits, which was referred to the Committee on Agriculture, of which he is a member. This bill is looked upon very favorably by many of the Representatives, both Democrats and Republicans. It will be reported to the House early in the coming week, and there are fair prospects that it will pass.
