LOCAL NEWS.

Only one bale of cotton received here to-day.
Rain is beginning to be seriously needed.
There were no interments in Bellevue Cemetery this week.
New moon this afternoon at 22 minutes past 5 o'clock.
The Register of Deeds issued no marriage licenses this week.
The New Hanover Criminal Court will convene next Monday.
Steamboatmen report that the water is very low in the Cape Fear.
The first week in June promises to witness a begonia from the city.
Plenty of vegetables, eggs, poultry &c., just now, but the meat market is poorly supplied.
There were eight interments in Pine Forest Cemetery this week, six adults and two children.
Rev. D. D. Dodge will deliver the address on Decoration Day at the National Cemetery.
There was one interment in Oakdale Cemetery this week; that of a child which was brought here from abroad.
There will be prayer meeting services at the Second Presbyterian Church to-morrow at 11 a. m. No services at night.
At 3 o'clock this afternoon the thermometer in this office registered 86 degrees, marking the warmest day of the season thus far.
Rev. Dr. Pritchard will preach at the First Baptist Church to-morrow morning and again at night. The subject of his sermon to-morrow night will be "Gambling."
Haytian barque *Hermance and Clara*, Teel, cleared to-day for Port-au-Prince, Hayti, with 120,000 feet of lumber and 25,000 shingles, valued at \$1,685, shipped by Messrs. E. G. Barker & Co.
The pulpit of the Fifth street Methodist church will be filled at the usual hours on to-morrow by Reverend Jas. W. Craig in the morning and Reverend E. A. Yates, D. D., in the evening.

The W. W. & O. R. R.

The Board of Directors of the Wilmington, Wrightsville and Onslow R. R. will meet in the city on Tuesday, June 10th. The meeting is to be held for the purpose of considering the early completion of the road. We understand that two propositions to this effect have been made by Northern parties, one to construct the road from Wilmington to Wrightsville and the other to carry it on from Wrightsville into Onslow county. A member of the Board tells us that he thinks it probable that the first of these propositions will be accepted and perhaps both. The terms offered, as explained to us, certainly seem very reasonable and if the contract is made we may yet ride to Wrightsville on the cars this summer.

City Court.
John Wright, a colored boy, was brought before the Mayor this morning charged with the larceny of a lot of brass from the steamer *Firefly*, at Wilson's mill, and was required to give a bond in the sum of \$50 for his appearance at the next term of the Criminal Court, in default of which he was committed.
Edward Larkins, colored, for being drunk and down was fined \$3.
The case of John Stubbs, charged with the shooting of Aleck Stewart, colored, which we reported yesterday, was then taken. Mr. Marsden Bellamy appeared as counsel for the accused and Mr. John D. Bellamy, Jr., appeared for the city. The accused, through his counsel, waived an examination and was required to give a bond in the sum of \$200 for his appearance at the next term of the Criminal Court.
Gallagher Brickhouse, who was with Stubbs when the shooting was done, was recognized as a witness in the case at the next term of the Criminal Court, in the sum of \$50.

He married the only daughter of Mr. George A. Southall, of Magnolia, who is well known to many of our citizens.

Pender Items.
From a letter received from an esteemed correspondent at Rocky Point, in Pender county, we learn that the crops in that section are very fine. The early truck business has not been so good as usual on account of the cool nights, but the standard crop of corn is excellent thus far. Mr. S. E. Roten has a fine stand of corn and cotton, one of the best ever seen in that section at this season of the year. His house caught fire on the roof a few days since and would have been destroyed had not his son, Mr. H. C. Roten, gone upon the building and torn off the burning shingles, although at times he was enveloped in flames and was considerably scorched and burned in his struggles to save the property.
The cholera is prevailing to a serious extent among hogs and poultry. Mr. Isaac W. Shepard lost by the disease 36 hogs, 40 chickens and a number of turkeys, and many others have lost heavily.
Rev. W. M. Kennedy met his congregation at Riley's Creek last Sunday and preached quite a practical sermon. He is much beloved by his congregation and has done much towards elevating the community to a higher plane of moral, social and religious principle.
