A speculator with fifty thousand dollars in the bonds of the Bungtown Railroad Company could borrow say \$20,000 on call at three or four per per cent. per annum, when an honest merchant doing a safe and legitimate business found it difficult to secure a discount of the mercantile paper taken in the regular course of trade for a fifth of that sum evet if he was willing to pay a simple interest."

The limited express train between Washington and New York is the finest in the world and one of the fastest as becomes the great Pennsylvania Company. It originated from a suggestion of Mr. Wm. T. 




