The New York Journal of Commerce lays an iron finger on a raw spot, thus: "Our banks and bankers for the last year or two have determined unwisely against commercial paper. A speculator with fifty thousand dollars in the bonds of the Bangtown Railroad Company could borrow say \$20,000 on call at three or four per cent per annum, when an honest merchant doing a safe and legitimate business found it difficult to secure a discount of the mercantile paper taken in the regular course of trade for a fifth of that sum, even if he was willing to pay a simple interest."

The limited express train between Washington and New York is the finest in the world and one of the fastest, as becomes the great Pennsylvania Company. It originated from a suggestion of Mr. Wm. T. Walters, of Baltimore, to Col. Thomas A. Scott. Mr. Scott hesitated to adopt the suggestion, when Mr. Walters said: "I will bet you \$500 to \$100 that if you put that train on you will never take it off, and that, on the contrary, the company will add to its comfort and facilities." Col. Scott acted on the proposition, and what Mr. Walters forecasted was more than realized promptly. The chances now are that there will be two such trains daily, for one is becoming insufficient for the traveling public.

Orrin A. Carpenter, whose long trial for the murder of Miss Zora Burns, his housekeeper, will be remembered, is now a homeless wanderer. He is the first man ever banished from Illinois, and he leaves his native town of Lincoln because it is impossible for him to live there. No one will speak with him, no one will do business with him; his wife and daughters are treated in the same way. Despite his acquittal, there are few people in Lincoln who believe Carpenter innocent, and when the result of his trial was announced a mass meeting of the citizens of the town was called to take action in the matter. As a result of the convention, a petition was signed by fully 1,000 men, asking Carpenter to leave Logan County immediately. This was served on him at his residence by a committee of seventy-five signers, and it seems to have had the desired effect. Mr. Carpenter has since sold his property and business, and made arrangements to leave but whether he takes his family no one knows.

Important disclosures are impending in the Grant & Ward failure, but when they will come depends largely upon the disposition of two sets of detectives who are working up the case. The developments would have been made four or five days ago had it not been that Inspector Byrne's forces were trying to get the best of the private detectives. Instead of working up the case, as they should have done, they have been devoting their time to watching each other. Rumor states that there is a nigger in this fence, and that there is money for the men who will prevent the true inwardness of the matter becoming public. At any rate it is well known that not half of the iniquity has been uncovered, and that when the real facts are obtained there will be enough evidence to send several men to State's prison. In the meantime the amount of money represented in the failure is daily increasing. There seems to be no limit to the number of men who have been drawn into the net. The strangest part of the whole affair is that the victims were generally capitalists who have a public reputation for shrewdness. Russell Sage, who is accredited with having cut more eye-teeth than any other man in Wall street, was even drawn into the mesh, but with his usual good luck got out with his lucres before the crash came. No one will believe that the capitalists and bankers who bit at the bait which Ward held out to them were really fooled in his ability to earn the enormous rewards promised by him by legitimate means. Their training taught them otherwise. The thing which tickled their palates and drew their gold was the belief that he had some crooked contracts whereby enormous profits could be reaped.

A New York letter says: "The exciting events in financial and business affairs have for the time being subtracted public interest from campaign politics, and this will probably tell to some extent against the Arthur meeting at Cooper Union on Tuesday evening. It is to be a business men's demonstration, professedly, but, unfortunately, not a few of the business men whose names were attached to the preliminary call have gone down in the Wall street maelstrom and are not likely, therefore, to put in an appearance. For the moment they have some thing more serious to think of than candidates for the Presidency. The friends

of Mr. Blaine to-day are circulating a call for a similar manifestation, which will be held within a week of the meeting of the Chicago Convention, in favor of such an administration of the Government as will enable the country to maintain its self-respect abroad, and restore to the American name its former prestige among the nations of the earth. The call is only in manuscript as yet, and it is used for private circulation among the followers of the 'Plumed Knight' at the up-town clubs, but, in due time, it will blossom into a formal summons for a public meeting at the Academy of Music in order to break the moral effect of the Arthur movement. Mr. Blaine's managers see that it will never do to have the impression go to Chicago, especially at a time like this, that the commercial classes are backing up any of his competitors, even in appearance, and hence the necessity for some sort of a counter check to the Cooper Union proceeding. They say for every merchant and banker on the Arthur call they can get a duplicate, or triplicate, and that too without any personal appeals on the floors of the down town exchanges. And what is more, they tell us their list of speakers will not be headed, as the Arthur meeting is, with a rampant free trader like Henry Ward Beecher."
