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A REPUBLICAN PLATFORM MADE OUT OF DEMOCRATIC LUMBER.

We yield much of our space to-day to the publication of the Republican platform for the campaign of 1884, as adopted at the Convention held in Chicago this week.

The Republicans of the United States, in National Convention assembled, renew their allegiance to the principles upon which they have triumphed in six successive Presidential elections, and congratulate the American people on the attainment of so many results in legislation and administration, by which the Republic has been saved.

We lament the death of President Garfield, whose sound statesmanship, long conspicuous in Congress, gave promise of a strong and successful administration, and the promise was fully realized during the short period of his office as President of the United States.

In the administration of President Arthur we recognize a wise, conservative and patriotic policy, under which the country has been blessed with remarkable prosperity, and we believe his eminent services are entitled to and will receive the hearty approval of every citizen.

It is the first duty of a good government to protect the rights and promote the interests of its own people. The largest diversity of industry is the most productive of general prosperity and of the comfort and independence of the people.

We recognize the importance of sheep husbandry in the United States, the serious depression which it is now experiencing, and the danger threatening its future prosperity, and we therefore respect the demands of the representatives of this important agricultural interest for a readjustment of the duty upon foreign wool, in order that such industry shall have full and adequate protection.

We have always recommended the best money known to the civilized world, and we urge that an effort be made to unite all commercial nations in the establishment of an international standard, which shall fix for all the relative values of gold and silver coinage.

The regulation of commerce with foreign nations and between the States is one of the most important prerogatives of the General Government, and the Republican party distinctly announces its purpose to support such legislation as will fully and effectually carry out the constitutional power of Congress over inter-State commerce.

The principle of public regulation of railway corporations is a wise and salutary one, for the protection of all classes of people, and we favor legislation that shall prevent unjust discrimination and excessive charges for transportation, and that shall prove to the people and to the railways alike, the fair and equal protection of the laws.

We favor the establishment of a National Bureau of Labor, the enforcement of the eight-hour law, and a wise and judicious system of general education by an adequate appropriation from the National revenues wherever the same is needed.

We believe that everywhere the protection due to citizens of American birth must be secured to citizens of American adoption, and we favor the settlement of international differences by international arbitration.

The Republican party, having its birth in the destruction of slave labor, to the end that all men may be free and equal, is unalterably opposed to placing our workmen in competition with any form of servile labor, whether at home or abroad.

iciously begun under Republican administration, should be completed by the further extension of the reform system already established by law to all grades of service to which it is applicable. The spirit and purpose of reform should be observed in all of the executive appointments, and all laws at variance with the objects of the existing reform legislation should be repealed, to the end that the dangers of free institutions which lurk in the power of official patronage may be wisely and effectually avoided.

The public lands are the heritage of the people of the United States, and should be reserved as far as possible for small holdings by actual settlers. We are opposed to the acquisition of large tracts of these lands by corporations or individuals, and especially where such holdings are in the hands of non-resident aliens; and we will endeavor to obtain such legislation as will tend to correct this evil.

The grateful thanks of the American people are due to the Union soldiers and sailors of the late war, and the Republican party stands pledged to suitable pensions for all who are disabled and for the widows and orphans of those who died in war. The Republican party also pledges itself to the repeal of the limitation contained in the act of 1878, so that all invalid soldiers shall share alike, and these pensions shall begin with the date of disability or discharge, and not with the date of application.

We demand the restoration of our Navy to its old time strength and efficiency, so that it may in any sea protect the rights of American citizens and the interests of American commerce; and we call upon Congress to remove the burdens under which American shipping has been depressed, so that it may again be true that we have a commerce which leaves no sea unexplored, and a Navy which takes no law from superior force.

Resolved, That the appointments by the President to offices in the territories should be made from bona fide citizens and residents of the territories wherein they are to serve.

Resolved, That it is the duty of Congress to enact such laws as shall promptly and effectually suppress the system of polygamy within our territory, and divorce the political from the ecclesiastical power of the so-called Mormon church, and that the law so enacted should be rigidly enforced by the civil authority if possible, and by the military if need be.

Resolved, That the people of the United States, in their organized capacity, constitute a nation and not a mere confederacy of States. The National Government is supreme within the sphere of its national duty, but the States have reserved rights which should be faithfully maintained. Each should be guarded with jealous care, so that the harmony of our system of government may be preserved and the Union kept inviolable.

The perpetuity of our institutions rests upon the maintenance of a free ballot, an honest count and correct returns. We denounce the fraud and violence practiced by the Democrats in the Southern States, by which the will of the voters is defeated, as dangerous to the preservation of free institutions and solemnly arraign the Democratic party as being the guilty recipient of the fruits of such fraud and violence.

We extend to the Republicans of the South, regardless of their former party affiliations, our cordial sympathy, and pledge to them our most earnest efforts to promote the passage of such legislation as will secure to every citizen, of whatever race or color, the full and complete recognition, possession and exercise of all civil and political rights.
