Anything that tends to promote international fraternal relations is to be encouraged, and hence the movement that is now afoot for a grand reunion in St. Louis of the Mexican and American veterans of the war of 1846-7 is one that will, no doubt, commend itself to public approbation.

Gen. Hancock is coming up grandly into view as a presidential probability and it may be that the same man who headed the ticket in 1880 will head it in 1884.

The "great fraud" of 1876 having been condoned by those most interested there remains to be atoned for the possibly greater fraud of 1880, in which John Kelly and the entire Tammany camp—sachems, braves, squaws and papposes—were involved.

In taking Representative McAdoo, of New Jersey, to task, says the New York Herald, the friends of Senator Logan in the House, in the vernacular with which the Republican candidate for the Vice Presidency is not unfamiliar, evidently "bit off more than they can chew."

In the Record appeared a speech by the Jersey Representative which was not delivered in Congress, but was "printed by leave." In the speech was a list, reproduced from a newspaper, of "land grabbers," among whom the name of Mr. John A. Logan appears as the holder of eighty thousand acres of the public lands.

Mr. McAdoo thereupon declared that he had "nothing to retract," in effect reiterated the charge about the eighty thousand acres, and made the point that it had been going the rounds of the press for six months without denial

by the now "sur-sensitive Senator" or his friends. But the gentleman from New Jersey, did not rest on the defensive. He assumed the aggressive with vigor. He indignantly replied the insinuation of cowardice and proceeded to give a practical test of his courage in the following manner:—

I might have asked the deluded soldiers what they thought of a great Senator who, in his greed to absorb the territory which belonged to the actual settlers in a land which was made for independent freeholders and small farmers, went, under the cover of his son-in-law, to New Mexico and tried to pre-empt most valuable land, and who was only stopped by the public surveyor, who found that it belonged to another class he professed the greatest friendship for—a rumor even had it that he had Indian blood in his veins. I might have said that he was trying to steal from his own kith and kin hundreds and thousands of acres, and was taking them from the unfortunate savages, who were unable to protect themselves, until an honest Secretary of the Interior had directed the surveyor to take back the lands for the Zuni.

It will be noticed that the speaker did not actually say these ugly things, but simply declared that he might have said them. Nevertheless, his remarks relate to a matter of current notoriety and in effect amount to a significant attack which cannot now go unnoted by those who were so ready to rush to the defence of their candidate against a less serious charge.
