IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—Mr. Slater, from the committee on Public Lands, submitted a report, to accompany the bill for the forfeiture of the unceded lands granted to the Northern Pacific Railroad Company.

Mr. Allison, from the committee on Appropriations, reported a bill to continue the public printing for seven days in advance of the appropriations to be hereafter made.

Mr. Morgan, from the committee on Public Lands, reported favorably a bill to forfeit the unceded lands granted to the Florida Railroad Company.

Mr. Morgan, from the committee on Public Lands, reported adversely the bill to grant public lands to the survivors of the Mountain Meadow massacre.

Mr. Sherman moved to amend by substituting three years for two. He thought two years too short a time.

Mr. Sherman's motion was not agreed to.

Mr. Hoar offered an amendment which was agreed to, extending the limit to the period of discharge of the grand jury at its next session after complaint shall be instituted; provided, the complaint be instituted within two years.

Mr. Sherman called attention to the fact that the two years limitation would apply to offences committed by collectors of internal revenue handling millions of dollars a year.

The Senate then proceeded with the consideration of the River and Harbor bill.

Consideration of the River and Harbor bill was then resumed. The five minutes rule was applied to the debate.

At 6.30 p. m., having disposed of the committee amendments, all of which were agreed to except the above noted, the Senate adjourned, leaving the other amendments to be proposed to-morrow.

The amendments of the Senate to the Deficiency Appropriation bill, on motion of Mr. Randall, were non-concurred in, and Messrs. Randall, Barnes and Calkins were appointed as conferees.

The following bills were introduced and referred:

By Mr. Lewis, of La., directing the Attorney-General to institute legal proceedings for the recovery and restoration of lands granted to the New Orleans, Baton Rouge & Vicksburg Railroad Co.

By Mr. King, of La., appropriating \$200,000, to be expended by the National Board of Health, to prevent the introduction and spread of Asiatic cholera in the United States.

By Mr. Bagly, of N. Y., to prohibit the business of importing gazaroni and beggars and hiring them out as laborers.

By Mr. Cox, of N. H., a preamble and resolution, reciting that on February 25th the House adopted a resolution calling on the President for all communications which have passed between the United States and Russia, with respect to the treatment of Hebrews by the latter government, and that no such communications have been transmitted, and respectfully requesting the President to comply with the resolution.

Mr. Randall introduced a joint resolution, providing that all appropriations for the necessary operations of the government under existing laws, which shall remain unprovided for after June 30th, 1884, shall be continued and made available for a period of five days from and after that date, unless the regular appropriation bill, now pending, shall have been previously enacted. Passed.

The House then went into committee of the Whole. Mr. Blount, of Ga., in the chair, on the Fortification Appropriation bill.

The committee then rose, and Mr. Elliott, of Pa., reported from the Elections committee a resolution declaring John S. Wise entitled to retain his seat as a Representative at large from Virginia. The minority report was presented by Mr. Turner, of Ga., and ordered printed.

Asheville Advance: It is said that never before has the Western counties of the State sent such a large delegation to the State Convention; a considerable number left the Asheville depot Monday afternoon, the greater number having passed down on Sunday.
