Judge Forker, who was one of the committee who informed Blaine of his nomination, has returned to Cincinnati, where he tells a reporter that he talked considerably with Blaine about the disaffection in the party. He represents Blaine as saying that he did not think the revolt in Massachusetts would amount to anything, but that the news in New York might, although he hoped to "beat it up" before election time—Blaine was also anxious about the German vote.

Tourists returning from Europe have long been in doubt as to the amount of wearing apparel they might bring back duty free. The Circuit Court of the United States for the Southern district of New York, in the case of Astor vs. Merritt, has decided that such passengers may bring—1, wearing apparel owned by the passengers, ready manufactured for wearing; 2, that brought with him for members of his family accompanying him as passengers ready and intended for wear; 3, that suitable for the season of the year immediately approaching, and 4, not exceeding in quantity, quality or value that which the passenger and his family are in the habit of providing for themselves in view of their means and habits of life, even though such articles have not been actually worn.

Kate Field reports a veritable polygamist craze in Utah, the church defying the nation and plural marriages constantly taking place. Prophet John Taylor has now revelations continually, and Miss Field writes that at the dedication of the new temple in Logan the greater part of the preaching dwelt upon obedience to the priesthood and the glories of celestial marriages. She tells a curious story of the experiences of the Logan newspaper men, who had gotten up for the Utah Journal, the only paper there, a complete account of the temple, its cost, the list of donors, &c.; the description was in type and the Journal was ready to print, when Taylor ordered the whole thing into pi. It seems that the temple cost \$500,000, and the law limits every church to \$50,000 worth of property in any given locality.

The theory of the Blaine managers according to the News and Courier, appears to be that Mr. Blaine will get the following "votes": The Hebrew vote, because he spoke severely about the persecution of the Jews by Russia; the Dynamite vote, because he is down on the English; the Star-route vote, for reasons not necessary to be mentioned; the Tammany vote, because John Kelly dislikes Tilden and Cleveland; the Johnny O'Brien vote, because Johnny O'Brien likes John Kelly; the County vote, because the country voter is so ignorant; the Soldiers' vote because of Logan; the Peanut vote, because it is the "Boys" who eat peanuts; the Cowboy vote, because the Cowboys like magnetism; the anti-Mexican vote, because Blaine is an annexionist; the Catholic vote, because Blaine was born a Catholic; the Congregational vote, because he is now a Congregationalist. In this way he expects to be able to dispense with the Republican vote altogether.

Quite a number of the prominent Northern journals mention the name of Ben Butler, the Caliban of American politics, as a Democratic Presidential possibility.

Of course, we do not believe there is any other than the remotest chance of such an occurrence, yet within the limits of politics there is nothing impossible except perfection. There is no question that he will be no mean factor in the Chicago Convention.

He is a bold, brave, wily, unscrupulous demagogue. Without creed, party or principles he is, truly, sui generis. A man so artful and shrewd is a dangerous tool to handle. He is the idol of a cranky, communistic element of American citizenship. He is a free lance in politics and stabs while he kisses. The party to which he is opposed finds in him the best friend. The leading journals understand very poorly the temper of the South if they imagine that under any circumstances she will accept General Butler. She is in thorough sympathy with the general government, and will vie with any section of the Union in devotion to its interests, but Butler could not command the Democratic vote. The South will joyously and enthusiastically rally to the standard of any of the many pure and noble gentlemen whom the Convention may present but she has no sympathy with Butler and his methods.

The South is the section that suffers most from Republican misrule and while she neither expects nor asks any recognition of the ticket, as she will furnish the major portion of the electoral

votes she will insist on having her interests consulted. Butler's nomination would mean inglorious defeat. Blaine and Butler! Truly would we be between the devil and the deep sea." Should such be the ticket, we pray that the avenging Nemesis of politics may smite both parties until a sense of reason and justice and honor returns.
