The Last of Earth.

The obsequies of the late Mr. John B. Craig were held at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon at his late residence on Walnut street, between Seventh and McKee. Rev. Dr. Yates, of the Front Street M. E. Church, officiated, assisted by Rev. Dr. Pritchard, of the First Baptist Church, Cape Fear Lodge, No. 2, I. O. O. F., of which the deceased was a member, escorted the remains to their last resting place at Oakdale, followed by a large concourse of friends and acquaintances. Messrs. John L. Dudley, H. W. Bryant, S. A. Craig, John Maunder, Oscar Pearsall and R. S. Townsend were the pallbearers.

Got Left.

Monday is always appropriated by the colored people, during the season, for making excursions down the river. This morning was no exception to the general rule, and for more than an hour before the appointed leaving time of the *Passport*, crowds of colored men, women and children, began to flock on board until by 8:30 the boat was crowded to her utmost capacity, while the streets still were thronged with others who were wending their way thither. When the boat finally left the wharf there were more than a hundred who could not be accommodated and to say that they were disappointed would not half express their feelings. Some of them bore their disappointment philosophically but others did not. Capt. Harper is one of the most accommodating of men, but he is restricted by very stringent laws and severe penalties from carrying more than a certain number.

Manhattan for August.

It will be a person hard to suit who cannot find something to interest him in the August *Manhattan*. The leading article in the *Yellowstone National Park*, by Ashley W. Cole, who has thoroughly explored the park, and writes about it graphically. Another paper is "Paul Delarocche and His Pupils," by Ernest Knauff, with reproductions of Delarocche's paintings, "The Hemicycle." The *New Produce Exchange* of New York is critically treated by Montgomery Schuyler. In "Women Artists of the Olden Time," J.
