So far as the crops are concerned, says the World, the outlook has never been so encouraging. Of course a great leal can happen between now and harvest time to alter the final outcome, but with moderately favorably conditions it is es imated by those in a position to judge that the wheat crop will be the largest in the history of the country, some estimates placing the yield as high as 550,000,000 bushels .-The accounts in regard to corn, cotton, hay, oats and other leading products of do. the soil are also of a favorable character. In Europe the crop conditions, according to responsible authorities. are anything but tavorable. Hence a larger foreign demand upon our resources is pretty well assured.

The export trade has recently shown a marked improvement. From this port alone the exports now average tully \$7,000,000 weekly, which is a part of the year. This is all the more significant because of the decrease in imports of merchandise. The two combined are steadily increasing our trade balance.

The outlook for the coal interests is also better. The impression that the coal combination would go to pieces has induced buyers to hold off and must result in a corresponding increase in the demand during the remainder of the year. It is expected that this will obviate the necessity for a prolonged suspension of mining, and the laborers will, in all probability, find steady employment. The situation offers much encouragement for a general improvement in business in the fall.

Pilots will bring all vessels from Ports south

of Cape Fear to the Quarantine anchorage; also, all vessels which have had any kind of sickness on board during the passage or on arrival, and will cause a signal to be set in the main rigging on the port side, as soon as possible after crossing the Bar.

No vessel must leave the Quarantine anchorage, or allow any person, steamer or tug boat, lighter, or boat of any kind to go along size, unless by written authority from the Quarantine Physician; and every vessel must be an chored as far to the eastward of the channel as is consistent with safety.
