At the electrical exhibition to be opened next month in Philadelphia, the simple key used by Professor Morse in sending the first dispatch from Washington to Baltimore will be shown, beside the latest improved synchronous multiplex machine, by which seventy-two messages can be sent over the same wire at the same time.

The Rochester (N. Y.) Union published the names of sixty-two Republicans in that city who declare their intention to vote for Cleveland and Hendricks. Among their number are twenty seven business and professional men. Like their independent brethren elsewhere they denounce Blaine as dishonest and corrupt.

The Ohio delegation contributed not a small part of the Protectionist contingent with which Mr. Randall went to the support of the Republicans in their fight against the Morrison tariff reform bill, and among the most ultra of the Ohio Protectionists was Mr. George L. Converse, of Columbus. Besides being pervaded with the spirit of the Ohio tariff plank, Mr. Converse was a shrewd politician versed in the art of manipulating local opinion to his own advantage. Yet, strange to say, the Congressional Convention of the thirteenth Ohio district has made Mr. J. Outhwaite, "an active Free trader," its nominee, giving the zealous opponent of "horizontal reduction" an opportunity to read up on the evils of excessive taxation. The Ohio Democrat may want the tax put up on wool, but he is not, it seems, after all, clean daft.

Here is a specimen of Republican campaign work. It comes in the shape of a special from Berkeley Springs, West Va., dated August 8th:

There is widespread indignation in this country over the revelations of the past twenty-four hours. For several days an unusual number of negroes have been coming from the East on the Baltimore and Ohio road, stopping, it is ascertained, at various small stations in West Virginia. Little or no heed was given to this until yesterday, when two car-loads of Ethiopians, said to be from Washington, passed Sir John's Run in charge of Conductor Cook, on board the Chicago express, bound for West Virginia stations. An investigation followed and the discovery that these negroes were the advance guard of hundreds to be imported into this State by the Republicans was made. It is believed that already 300 of these imported voters are in the State and hundreds more are to follow.

City Court.

Sally Walker and Grace Austin, two colored damsels, were brought before the Mayor this morning, charged with disorderly conduct. They were fined \$5 each, in default of which they were sent below for 20 days.

Two colored men, whose names we suppress by request, were charged with disorderly conduct on Saturday night, and were fined \$3 each.

A Narrow Escape.

Jefferson Robinson, colored, who lives on the corner of Front and Queen streets, fell overboard at about 7 o'clock last night from the wharf between Dock and Market streets. He was somewhat intoxicated at the time and was rescued with difficulty after he had nearly lost consciousness. Instead of going home and receiving the benefit of warm clothing and a comfortable bed, he went into the office occupied by Messrs. C. S. Love & Co., where he remained all night. This morning he was entirely helpless and a carriage was called by which he was conveyed to his home.

A Desperate Fight.

About 9 o'clock last Saturday night a disturbance occurred at a bar room kept by Josea and Fred Hawes, colored, on Dock street, between Front and South Water, which was quite serious in its consequences. The origin of the trouble was a dispute over a game of cards between Fred Hall, a carpenter, and John Gibson, a stevedore, and during the melee the latter received three savage cuts—one across the upper lip, a severe gash in the right side and a terrible cut across the abdomen so that the intestines protruded. The wounded man was taken to J. C. Hill's office, where his wounds were sewed up by Dr. Macomber and he was conveyed to his home. He charged that the cutting was done by Hall, and Officer Millis, who happened to be in the vicinity, arrested the accused, and a commitment having been made out, he was lodged in jail to await the result of the injuries to Gibson. Hall alleges that there was a general attack made upon him, and that he was knocked down with a chair. As many as a dozen persons, all of whom were colored, were engaged in the affray. The instrument with which the cutting was done could not be found. The wounded man this morning was doing as well as could be expected, and unless something serious should occur, will recover in a short time.
