Illustrating Chinese cheap labor and competition, the cigar manufacturers of San Francisco are useful examples. While there are about 500 white persons employed, there are about 7,000 or 8,000 Chinese, and the white men receive \$11 to \$23 50 a week and the Chinese \$5.

Henry M. Stanley, who is to help the British to rescue Chinese Gordon, was once desperately in love with one of the daughters of the millionaire Pike, who built the opera house by that name in Cincinnati. The parents disapproved and the obscure Bohemian became famous.

Cremation is making great strides in France. The Prefect of the Seine means to establish Siemens furnaces in several of the cemeteries of Paris, and proposes to cremate all persons whose bodies are not claimed by their friends. If this experiment prove successful, the government will probably introduce a general bill on cremation.

Mary Anderson's Summer advertising of the social kind has had a good effect. In her appearance at the London Lyceum the house was packed to the roof and the audience most enthusiastic and liberal in its applause. Among the literary and social notabilities present were Minister Lowell, Consul General Merritt and Oscar Wilde. Miss Anderson surpassed herself.

From the days of Cortez, in 1521, down to the beginning of this century, even to the present time, except when interrupted by revolution, the Mexican silver mines have poured forth an unceasing stream of silver, such as the world has never seen. It is estimated that the value of the silver coin and bullion produced in that country since the conquest is over \$3,000,000,000, and it is well known that some of the mines have been profitably worked almost without interruption from that day to this, and that one of them, at least, is still running out silver at the rate of over \$5,000,000 a year.

The cultivation of wheat has almost ceased in Ireland and Scotland, has greatly diminished in the western part of England, and is steadily declining in the eastern.

Ex-Secretary Fish is out in a card denying the statement published by the World that he would vote for Cleveland. He will vote for Blaine. We suppose that the World also falsified about Bristow. The less you have to do with the World the nearer you are to the truth as a general thing. We would as soon trust the Sun-Morning Star.

Really, if there is any falsification in this matter it has not been made by the World, for that paper has never yet said that Mr. Fish would vote for Cleveland. It said that Bristow would, and Bristow has not yet denied it and it said that Mr. Fish had expressed very plainly his low opinion of Mr. Blaine and his high opinion of Mr. Cleveland. We make these remarks merely to set the matter right. The World is a true, honest, upright, manly, fearless and uncompromising advocate of the Democratic party of the United States and as such is recognized as the organ of that party all over the country and it is not a good time now to attempt to belittle its influence.

Eggs were selling at 30 cents per dozen at some of the grocery stores this morning.

Steamboatmen report that the rise in the river occasioned by the recent rains amounted to about four feet.

The sidewalk on the West side of Nutt street is in a miserable condition and ought to be repaired.

A gentleman who has just returned from a ten days' trip in the country, tells us that the cotton crop, where he has been, will be very short. He thinks that not more than half a crop will be made.

We hope that there will be a good turnout at the meeting of the Third Ward Democratic Club, at the City Court Room to-night. It is for the purpose of reorganization and will be an important meeting.

The street brigade are busy repairing the streets, sidewalks and crossings which were badly washed during the recent rains. They will find it considerable of a job before they get through.

The receipts of cotton at this port to-day foot up 370 bales.

There will be an important meeting of the Young Men's Progressive Democratic Club, at the City Court Room, to-morrow night.

The survivors of the lost steamer *Dos Hermanos* are yet in the city and will probably not leave until the next steamer sails for New York.

The Wilmington Light Infantry are making earnest endeavors to turn out with full ranks for their tour of duty at the State Exposition at Raleigh. They wish to parade with at least 40 men and we hope to see them with that number in the ranks.

The first installments of New River oysters were received here to-day by Capt. J. M. McGowan and Mr. Will West, and are on sale by those gentlemen. It is certainly early in the season for them yet they open well and are as fat and well flavored as any October oysters we have ever seen.

### Slight Fire.

The roof of the kitchen on the premises occupied by officer N. Carr, on Fifth street, between Hanover and Brunswick, caught fire this forenoon around the fine of the chimney. It was discovered soon after it had ignited and the flames were extinguished by the application of a few buckets full of water, although quite a hole was burnt in the roof. No general alarm was given.

### Campaign Funds.

It is rumored here that one of the clerks in the Postoffice in this city has been discharged and that the salaries of those who remain have been cut down \$25 each. This, it is said, has been rendered necessary by the exigencies of the campaign. Mr. Steve Elkins must have soap and as the moneyed men of the North will not pony up the poor clerks throughout the country must be levied upon to help elect Mr. Mulligan Blaine, the author of the "Dear Fisher" letters, to the Presidency of this great country.

### City Court.

Cad Lowery, colored, was brought before the Mayor this morning charged with disorderly conduct. He was adjudged guilty and a fine of \$5 was imposed, in default of which he was sent below for 20 days.

Frank Perry, also colored, for a like offense, was assessed \$5, but as he could not raise that amount he was sent to the city prison for 20 days.

Thomas Brown, a colored drayman, for being disorderly and quarrelsome at a colored festival last night, was fined \$10, in default of which he was sent below for 30 days.

**Increased Accommodations.**  
We note that Messrs. Hollingsworth & Sikes have recently made extensive and important alterations and improvements in their stables, corner Fourth and Mulberry streets, rendered necessary by the increase of business. An addition running the entire length of the large building, on the North side, has been made for the accommodation of horses and this gives up all of the main building to the housing of vehicles. As it is, they have hardly room enough for the demands of the business and a still further increase of accommodations may soon be necessary.
