These are, as we have said, the alleged grounds of the Tribune's confidence. The real grounds are the subscription of Jay Gould, William H. Vanderbilt, Russell Sage, C. P. Huntington, Mr. Astor and others, aggregating half a million of dollars, for special use in Ohio; the return of Minister Morton, who is relied on, with his own subscription of \$100,000, for another half million; the purchase of votes, colonization, frauds on the ballot-box and other Republican rascalities.

It would be singular if the Republicans should not carry Ohio in October. For twenty-eight years Ohio has been a reliable Republican State in every Presidential year. Here is the vote:
