The New York World, in its Friday's issue, presents the situation of affairs just as it seems to stand now, the result of the election in Ohio and West Virginia having been definitely determined.

For Cleveland certain: Alabama, 10; Arkansas, 7; Delaware, 3; Florida, 4; Georgia, 12; Kentucky, 13; Louisiana, 8; Maryland, 8; Mississippi, 9; Missouri, 16; North Carolina, 11; South Carolina, 9; Tennessee, 12; Texas, 13; Virginia, 12; West Virginia, 6. Total, 153.

For Blaine certain: Maine, 6; Massachusetts, 14; Minnesota, 7; Nebraska, 5; New Hampshire, 4; Pennsylvania, 30; Rhode Island, 4; Vermont, 4. Total, 74.

Doubtful, but with a Democratic record and strongest probabilities for Cleveland: Connecticut, 6; Indiana, 15; New Jersey, 9; New York, 36. Total, 66.

Doubtful, with chances about even: California, 8; Illinois, 22; Iowa, 13; Kansas, 9; Michigan, 13; Nevada, 3; Oregon, 3; Wisconsin, 11. Total, 62.

Doubtful, with chances probably favoring Blaine: Colorado, 3; Ohio, 23. Total, 26.

Necessary to elect—301 electoral votes. The World adds: Although set down as "debatable," there is absolutely no doubt about it that the Democrats will carry Connecticut, Indiana, New Jersey and New York, which with the 153 certain Democratic electoral votes of the Southern States, will give Cleveland 219 votes, or 78 more than a majority of the Electoral College.

The Republican party must go if the Republic is to stay. California is more likely to remain Democratic than to turn back to Republicanism, and Oregon will follow in her wake.
