Every man owes a duty to his party and it is a duty that should be paid cheerfully and with alacrity. The ballot is not only the privilege and prerogative of the American freeman, but it is an imperative obligation as well. A man may have a right to neglect his own interests, but not those of his neighbors, and when he refuses or neglects to register and vote he is imperiling the interests of his neighbors as well as his own. Good government is a beneficent boon and yet it is not in this country a boon accorded by Heaven but one secured by the acts of the people. Providence finds the method but the people must themselves furnish the means. Hence we look upon it as almost a crime for a man who can vote to stay away from the polls on election day, either through an indifference as to the result or through over confidence that any present exertion on his own part will not be needed by his party. "One vote don't count" is the most pernicious reasoning imaginable; in fact, it is not reasoning at all but the merest sophistry to blind one's own conscience as to the possible effects of one's own acts. In North Carolina every vote will be needed on election day and every vote will tell. We cannot afford to take any risks, and every man who stays away from the polls on that day is taking a risk that may result in disaster. The following, from the Goldsboro Messenger, will be found very pertinent to this subject: Notwithstanding the many cheering indications daily received from all parts of the State of victory for the Democracy—or rather to the white man's party of North Carolina—we feel called upon to warn our friends, here and elsewhere, of the danger that threatens in over-confidence. We must make assurance doubly sure by an effective concentration of action, which will bring out every Democratic voter in the State. Our opponents are active. They are completely organized. Their 100,000 negroes present a solid phalanx. Their opposition to the white race is fully aroused. The issue is too transcendently important to permit the prospects of success, however brilliant, to lull us into supineness. The Radical party, as everybody knows, once brought us to the brink of revolution and bankruptcy. Need we point to the dark days of 1868-'69 and '70, when corruption reigned supreme in the State, when tyranny and despotism ruled, when innocent men were thrown into loathsome dungeons, when infamous cutthroats were employed to kill leading Democratic citizens of the State? Need we point to the millions stolen from the treasury? Need we recall the disturbed State of our society when the torch and ravisher stalked all over the State? Need we point to the general distrust and insecurity then prevailing on all sides—to the infamous Kirk War, to the suspension of the writ of the sacred writ of habeas corpus and the exhaustion of the Judiciary? These times and crimes are still so fresh in the minds of our people that it is only necessary to remind them of them. Then forward! Forward! Forward! To return this State into the hands

of the Republican party means a return to all this and more. And should they regain that power it would then be more than impossible for us to ever regain our liberties and prosperity. We must, therefore, use every honorable means to roll up such decisive majorities that the infamous party will never again offer itself in a contest for State supremacy. The honest white people cannot be unaware of the fearful risk they run by indifference or by countenancing any one of the Republican candidates. No matter how clever they may be, each and every mother's son of them is the exponent and representative of that terribly corrupt party. To prevent the possibility of a renewal of the times above portrayed; a return to Radical extravagance and corruption; to prevent the utter demoralization of our society and a return to lawlessness and tyranny, we must have a large Democratic majority in the Legislature! We must have an honest Governor and honest State officials! We must have Democratic county officers! We must carry the State by such overwhelming majority that it will strike terror in the souls of the conspirators, who are now aiming at the usurpation of power. This we have no doubt we will be able to accomplish, but we can do so only by a united effort—by timely concert of action. Let every white man enroll himself under the white man's banner. "United we stand, divided we fall!" Forward! Forward! Forward! Organize! Organize!

Quarantine Notice. QUARANTINE FOR THE PORT OF Wilmington will be enforced from May 1st to November 1st, as follows: Pilots will bring all vessels from Ports south of Cape Fear to the Quarantine anchorage; also, all vessels which have had any kind of sickness on board during the passage, or on arrival, and will cause a signal to be set in the main rigging on the port side, as soon as possible after crossing the Bar. No vessel must leave the Quarantine anchorage, or allow any person, stranger or dog, to board, lighter, or boat of any kind, to go along side, unless by written authority from the Quarantine Physician; and every vessel must be anchored as far to the eastward of the channel as is consistent with safety. Regulations governing vessels while in Quarantine may be had on application at the office of the Quarantine Physician at Smithville. Applications for permits to visit vessels in Quarantine must be made to Dr. Thomas F. Wood or Dr. Geo. G. Thomas, and permits so obtained will be endorsed by the Quarantine Physician, if, in his opinion, it is proper and safe to allow communication with such vessels. A penalty of \$2.00 for each and every offense, will be enforced against any person violating any of the Quarantine regulations of the Port. W. G. CURTIS, M.
