## Quarantine Notice. QUARANTINE FOR THE PORT OF WII-

mington will be enforced from May 1st to Novomber 1st, as follows:

Pilots will bring all ve-sels from Ports south of Cape Fear to the Quarantine anchorage; also, all vessels which have had any kind of sickness on board during the passage, or on arrival, and will cause a signal to be set in the main rigging on the port side, as soon as possible after crossing the Bar No vessel must leave the Quarantine anchor-

age, or allow any person, steamer or tug boat, lighter, or boat of any kind to go along si 'e, unless by written authority from the Quaran-tine Physician; and every vessel must be an chored as far to the eastward of the channel as is consistent with safety.

Regulations governing vessels while in Quarantine may be had on application at the office of the Quarantine Physician at Smithville Applications for permits to visit vessels in Quarantine must be made to Dr. Thomas F.

Thomas, and permits so obtained will be endorsed by the Quarantine Physician, if, ia his opinion, it is proper and safe to allow communication with such vessels A penalty of \$2 0 for each and every offence, will be enforced against any person violating any of the Quarantine Regulations of the Port
