Cotton.

The receipts of cotton at this port for the week ending with to-day foot up 33,514 bales, as against 33,320 bales for October, 1883, an increase this month of 194 bales. The receipts of the crop year to date foot up 45,603 bales as against 41,016 bales to same date last year, an increase this month of 4,587 bales.

Harbor Master's Report.

During the month ended October 31st, 1884, the number of vessels arriving at this port is as follows: American—5 steamers, 4,535 tons; 2 brigs, 666 tons; 21 schooners, 5,800 tons, making a total of 28 vessels and 11,001 tons.

Foreign—3 steamers, 3,067 tons; 10 barques, 4,181 tons; 5 brigs, 1,537 tons, making a total foreign of 18 vessels and 8,785 tons and a grand total of 46 vessels and 19,786 tons.

Br. barque Bristol, Hoodless, cleared to-day for Glasgow with 2,954 barrels of rosin, valued at \$3,009, shipped by Messrs. Paterson, Downing & Co. Schr. C. H. Macomber, Rumill, cleared for Gonaves, Hayti, with 103-500 feet of lumber and 57,150 shingles, valued at \$1,721.47, shipped by Messrs. Northrop & Cumming, making a total of exports foreign amounting to \$4,790.47.
