The German hop crop this year will yield about 420,000 cwt. The crop in the United States is larger than that of last year, and on the Pacific coast the gain is reported to be 30,000 bales of 180 pounds each.

Lord Lytton, according to his wife's account, always dressed at least five years in advance of the mode as interpreted in Britain, and was the first man to introduce lace frills and canes into England.

General John Newton, in his annual report, asks \$688,000 for the defense of Boston Harbor by the construction of batteries. He asks no appropriation for the work on the existing defenses of Boston and the Charlestown Navy-yard.

Henry M. Stanley, the African traveler, says that when he first sighted the Lower Congo there was a population there of only nineteen Europeans—two English, two Dutch, one German, one Belgian, one Frenchman and twelve Portuguese.

The history of the Democratic party is perhaps the most remarkable on record. It has preserved its organization under twenty-five years of defeat, including four years of war, and at last comes out victorious. We have great reason to be proud.

Farming in Dakota Territory is a dangerous rival to journalism. When the editor has business on his farm he simply suspends circulation and writes: "Owing to the fact that the editor was out in the country threshing, this issue came out one day late."

The railway up Vesuvius has already paid for itself; the trains, which ascend night and day, are well patronized by native and foreign sight-seers, all strangers ascending nowadays, whereas formerly a foot ascent was so irksome that only the daring undertook the round trip.

The official count in New York is nearly completed and so far as it has progressed it shows a slight gain for Cleveland. There is no doubt of his election and every one but the Blaine managers concedes it. It may be that the returns as made known to-morrow will show that they too acknowledge this fact.

A boy was born in the North of England a short time ago who had living four grandparents and five great-grandparents, all of whom are actively engaged in earning a livelihood. The fact is strange enough in itself, but is more so when it is learned that the village in which these people have been living from their birth is one of the most unhealthy towns in England.

A tunnel 5,000 feet long, that was constructed at least 900 years before the Christian era, has been discovered on the Island of Samos. It is mentioned by Herodotus, and was excavated to supply the old seaport with drinking water. It is completely preserved and contains water-tubes of about twenty-five centimetres in diameter, each one provided with a lateral aperture for cleansing purposes.

Cleveland is the second citizen of New York who was ever elected President. The first was Martin Van Buren in 1836. Millard Fillmore was a New Yorker and so is President Arthur, but neither was elected President by the people. Fillmore was elected Vice President by the Whigs and became President by the death of General Taylor, while Arthur obtained the position in "the lottery of assassination."

Of all European countries, Germany is the country where suicide is most frequent, and in Germany, again, Saxony takes the lead. In 1873 the number of suicides in Saxony amounted to 687 (266 to every 1,000,000 inhabitants); five years later it rose to 1,114, and after five years more to 1,872. Last year, 9,004 persons thus ended their lives, 1,081 of whom were of the male sex and 923 of the female. In England, in 1882, the suicides were 1,216 men and only 549 females.
