The highest prize by a long way ever offered for a literary performance will be awarded in 1925 to the successful author of a simple biography. Fifty years ago, it is said, Gen. Arantseff, the friend and confidential adviser of the Emperor Alexander I. deposited in the Imperial Bank of Russia the sum of 50,000 roubles, which is to be allowed to accumulate at interest till the 1st of December, 1925, when the entire amount principal and interest, is to be handed over to the author of the best work on the life and reign of Alexander I.
