The Count of Paris recently had made one hundred cravat pins, each bearing, in precious stones set in gold, the Bourbon emblems, and he is giving them to his political friends.

Vermont, which had almost 100,000 children in her common school in 1810, has now less than 73,000 children in them, through the number of those of the population under 20 years of age is only five per cent. less now than in 1840.

An old lady has lately died at Benares who was in many respects one of the most remarkable personages in Northern India. She was the daughter of a general in the Bengal Cavalry, and was in her 97th year. She was married at fifteen, had eighteen children, eighty grandchildren, seventy-three great-grandchildren, and five great-great-grandchildren. She had never been out of India for a single day.

The apostles of male dress reform in England appear to be in deadly earnest. Their present gospel is the inculcation of the blue coat and brass buttons, white waistcoat, light gray trousers and powdered hair.
