City Court.

The business of the court this morning, although not large, was of an important and grave character and all of which Mayor Fowler very promptly turned over to the Criminal Court.

John Baker, charged with larceny, pleaded guilty. An investigation of the case showed that Baker, who is a young man, arrived in the city last Tuesday night, and in company with another stranger, obtained lodging at the boarding house of Mrs. Leitgen, on South Front street. They slept in a room occupied by Mr. N. Paul, and when the latter awoke the next morning the strangers were gone, as was also a bag belonging to him which contained \$100. Mr. Paul made his loss known to Mayor Fowler who issued a warrant for the arrest of the parties which he put in the hands of officer N. Carr for service. The latter with Mr. Paul, went to Rocky Point on the train yesterday afternoon, where they found Baker with \$90 in greenbacks, \$12.50 in silver, and a second class ticket to Weldon for which he had just paid \$4.45. The money was in the bag in which it was when stolen from Mr. Paul. The defendant acknowledged his guilt and exculpated the other suspected party. He was bound over to the present term of the Criminal Court in the sum of \$100, in default of which he was committed.

Frank Moss and Henry Richardson, the latter being colored, were charged with an affray in which deadly weapons were used. They were both bound over to the present term of the Criminal Court in the sum of \$50.
