Some idea of the scale of the tunneling operations under the bed of the Harleyp River, in connection with the new Croton aqueduct, may be formed from the fact that the shaft which has been sunk on the northerly bank of the river to meet the mouth of the tunnel is 426 feet in depth—more than the length of two city blocks. It is 36 by 17 feet in length and breadth, with two elevators running day and night, each capable of accommodating twenty men. Excavation is going on at the rate of nine feet per day. So far the tunnel has progressed 550 feet into the bed of the river. The distance to be completed is 1,300 feet. The tunnel is lighted by electricity from a dynamo above ground.

Since the slave trade was abolished in Egypt, an asylum for female slaves has been maintained at Cairo. The slave trade is still carried on surreptitiously to some extent, and efforts are especially made to procure inmates for the harems of the wealthy. In 1886 one hundred and seventy female slaves intended for the harems were rescued, and provided with a home at the asylum. Most of these women are negroes, but some of them were pretty Circassian and Abyssinian girls. All these women are retained at the asylum until they received some education and are fitted to support them selves by work provided for them. During the year thirty slave dealers were found guilty and sentenced to prison.

A Chinese missionary says he thinks that it will be many years before railroads can be built in China, because of the superstition of the people. China, he says, is one vast graveyard. On every side there are to be found the mounds of those who have died. The Chinese will not allow these mounds to be disturbed under any circumstances. Their superstition forbids the removal of a body or the interference with the grave of any person once buried with the proper ceremonies. Twice a year they visit the graves of their ancestors, in the spring with offerings of the first fruits of the season, and in the fall they repair to the graves and burn incense. If a railroad should attempt to enter the country some of these mounds would have to be removed, or else the rails would have to wind in and out among them.

High license has had a trial in a number of States in the West and Northwest, and the results are such as to interest the ways and means committee of State Legislatures, if not the Prohibitionists. Illinois imposes a tax of \$500 on saloons, with the result of reducing their number by one-third and increasing the State's revenues from this source from \$700,000 to \$4,500,000. Chicago has 4,000 saloons, instead of 6,000, and gets from them about \$2,000,000 instead of \$300,000. The Minnesota high license law has decreased the number of saloons by about 1,600. In Winona the law has reduced the number from eight to one, and in Caledonia from fifteen to four. In Missouri, where the new law fixes the maximum cost of a license at \$1,200 and the minimum at \$550, the revenue has been trebled. Nebraska has a license fee of \$1,000 in cities and \$500 elsewhere. The effect has been to cut down the number of drinking places nearly one-half, and to increase the State's revenue five-fold. Wholesale dealers in Michigan pay a license fee of \$800, and the retailers pay from \$300 to \$500. The result is an increase of revenue to millions, and a reduction of the number of saloons from 10,000 to 5,000. Local option is, however, to be credited with part of the reduction in number of saloons. Ohio has placed a tax of \$200 on all general liquor stores and a tax of \$100 on beer saloons. The revenue has thus been increased to about \$2,000,000. In Atlanta, Ga., the fee is \$1,500, but it has been required for so short a time that its results cannot yet be fully estimated.
