The committee appointed to consider and examine the letter of application of the W., O. & E. C. R. R. Co., and the accompanying petition Seacoast railroad for right of way, asking for the submission to the etc. qualified voters of the city of the question of a subscription by the city to said company in the sum of \$100,000 respectfully report.

That the charter of said railroad company and the amendatory act of the Legislature pertaining thereto. make it mandatory on this Board to order an election on the question of subscription whenever one-fifth of the qualified voters of the city shall petition therefor; that the commit tee have carefully examined and scrutinized the petition accompanying the application of the said rail road company and find that the same contains the names of more one-fifth of the qualified voters of the city as required by law. Your committee, therefore, respectfully recommend that an election be called submitting the question of sub scription to said railroad in the sum of \$100,000 to the voters of the city, agreeably to said application and the terms of the charter of said com pany. The committee further re commend that in the event of the subscription being ratified at the election, the proposition of the rail road company to place the bonds in escrow, to be paid out pro rata as the work progresses mile by mile, be accepted, with the right on the part of the city to pay said subscrip tion in eash in lieu of bonds.

Alderman Ricand said that he desired to state for the information of the Board that the charter of the railroad company provided that if bonds were issued they should bear six per cent. interest, and the committee thought that the city could place its bonds at a lower rate of interest and effect a considerable sav ing by paying the cash instead of
