All the counties in Michigan which have held elections under the new local option law, fourteen in number, have been carried in favor of prohibition. There is said to be strong probability that at least twenty more will declare in the same way as soon as elections in them occur. This is a similar result | el, February 18 and 19. to that which has been attained in other States, notably Missouri, Illinois and Ohio, by the application of and 26. the local option principle. It is a curious fact, however, that the professional Prohibitionists oppose the local option principle almost as bitterly as they do liquor license or tax laws, probably because of the increasing tendency to use the two in conjunction as furnishing the surest method of restriction.

Having monopolized the supply of refined sugar for the United States market, the Sugar Trust now desires to control the agencies by which the supply is distributed to consumers, and with this end in view it has undertaken to handicap the small wholesalers for the benefit of the large ones. All wholesalers have heretofore received a discount of one-half of 1 per cent without re gard to the quantities bought by them. Hereafter this discount will be allowed to those who buy less Dauggists, or sent postpaid on receipt of than 100 barrels, but those who buy more than 100 and less than 1,000 barrels will receive a discount of 1 per cent, while all who buy more than 1,000 barrels will receive 13 per ent. Under such conditions a few large wholesalers can undersell all others. The tendency of such a policy is to place the wholesale trade in the hands of a few persons. The small wholesalers may complain, as do the importers whose cargoes must be sold without the benefit of competition, but what are they going to do about it? They suffer in company with consumers. Congress can bring relief by reducing or removing the duties on re-
