The New York Commercial Bulletin says that one thousand men will be put to work on the Carolina, Knoxville and Western Railroad next month.

The famous Goodwin sands in the British Channel are disappearing. They have receded half a mile toward the shore and give signs of generally breaking up.

The Chicago Tribune, the New York World and the Atlanta Constitution vigorously oppose the Senate bill which has for its ostensible purpose the prevention of the adulteration of lard.

A company has been formed in Peru for the purpose of searching for and working the old Inca gold mines, and also to open old cemeteries, where it is believed millions of dollars are buried.

Mrs. Frank Leslie is reported as advising young women to seek employment in drawing rather than literature. Engraving and illustrating are fields less crowded and offering a better chance to women.

The relatives of the millionaire Snell, who was recently murdered by burglars in his residence in Chicago, have offered a reward of \$20,000 for the arrest, or information that will lead to the arrest, of the murderers.

The Cleveland Democratic Club of Buffalo has resolved to devote the discussions of its meetings entirely to tariff reform, and it proposes to circulate documents giving the facts on the issue to the voters from now until election.

This is the semi centennial year of Mercer University, at Macon, Ga., and it is decided to celebrate it in an appropriate manner during commencement week in June next. Col. R. M. Johnston, of Baltimore, has been invited to deliver an address on the occasion.

It is said that Dr. McGlynn is being used as a cat's paw by certain designing politicians in the ranks of the United Labor party. It is their object to bring about a complete estrangement between the ex-priest and Henry George, and they seem to be succeeding admirably. As this is a campaign year there will be much boodle distributed, and certain leaders of the United Labor party, it is said, will be able to get a good slice of it if Henry George is out of the way.

We think that the people of the Third district have done well in securing such an earnest, hard-working and indefatigable representative as Maj. McClannay is making. He has been in a position to feel the need of legislation for years past and now he is where he can urge it upon the law making power, himself a member of that body. He has recently introduced an amendment to the revenue laws which is strikingly bold and original. The object of this amendment is simply to put off

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the collection of all revenue taxes due and payable on the first of May until the 31st day of December. The proposed amendment is a wise one as any relief obtained cannot be made available before the first of May, when the tax has to be paid. This immense amount of money will be kept in the pockets of the people, where it ought to stay, as the government does not need it.

Maj. McClannay seems to have the warm endorsement of some of the most prominent Democrats in Congress in his attempt to thus give relief to our people and we trust that he may be successful.

Death of Mr. Miles C. Smith.
It is with sincere sorrow that we are called upon to announce the death of Mr. Miles C. Smith, which occurred at about 11 o'clock last night. He had been suffering for several months with disease of the heart and kidney disease and for some weeks there had been but little hope of his recovery. The deceased was 32 years of age and was unmarried. He had been for several years a salesman for Messrs. Giles & Murchison, and only left their employ when compelled to do so by the inroads of the disease of which he died. He was a consistent member of the First Presbyterian Church, and was a young man full of promise, and much esteemed by all who knew him.

City Court.
There was a small and unimportant docket for the Mayor's consideration this morning, and it was disposed of in the following order:

Aleck Bazille, colored, for resisting an officer while in the discharge of his duty, was required to pay a fine of \$25 or work 30 days in the chain gang.

James Tillis, New York; Frank Wilson, Atlanta; John Miller, Mississippi, and Augustus Mahony, Savannah, were foot tourists who registered at the guard house and were fed and lodged at the city's expense. The first two were ordered to work ten days in the chain gang. Miller, who has seen more than seventy years, was held, as he claimed that he had a son in the city, and Mahoney was given an escort outside the city limits, with a warning not to be caught here again.

The Great Levy.
The great and incomparable cornetist, Jules Levy, will appear at the Opera House to-morrow night and at a matinee to-morrow afternoon. He will have a strong company of first-class vocal and instrumental artists with him, but he will be a host in himself. In speaking of this wonderful artist, the New Orleans Times-Democrat says:

Again last night there was another throng to hear the wonderful Levy on the cornet. It is needless now to speak of his pieces, for the public have learned to appreciate his classical performances. Rich in expression, he by his remarkable skill makes the cornet rather a vocal organ than a piece of mechanism controlled by merely absolute stops. Now soaring aloft on the pinions of airy grace, and then descending, touches the softer feelings with his more pathetic passages. Such music cannot be written in the score. It comes from the performer and it is his appreciation and feeling that gives to the musical notation the pathos which plays upon the diviner strings of our being.

More Hotel Accommodations.
A reader of the REVIEW writes us as follows: "With increased facilities for reaching the seashore this summer, with an increase of visitors and with its pleasant and healthy climate, Wilmington needs greater hotel accommodations. I fully believe that many who now spend their winters in Florida would spend them here and many wearied travelers would stop over night here if we had more suitable and proper hotel accommodations. We need at least another large and first class hotel for although the Orton is doing a great and good work for our city it is unable to accommodate all.

Why then does not the Atlantic Coast Line or some of our moneyed men invest some of their surplus money in an investment of this character, which must surely pay?

The lot on which the old Front Street Methodist Church stood can be purchased and from its location and surroundings and its close proximity to the railroads could be an excellent location for a hotel or boarding house, and if it could be disposed of for this purpose it would assist a worthy congregation to improve another portion of our city by the completion and occupancy of their new and pretty house of worship.

The seats to be used during the Pearson meetings are now in course of construction at the mill of Messrs. Fore & Foster, on Sixth street, and they will be all ready and placed in position before the meetings are begun.

Trial Practice.
The steam fire engine A. Adrian, after having been thoroughly overhauled and had new flues fitted to her boiler, was out for trial practice for awhile this afternoon. She took a position at market dock and played towards Front street, and we are glad to state that the trial proved entirely satisfactory.

The Bad Road.
Mr. H. A. Bagg, Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, has recently had some repairs made to the road which runs near the Poor House. The repair of the road between Little Bridge and North East River rests with the Board of Supervisors in the township and their road overseers, and not with the Commissioners. The road is all in Cape Fear township and the Magistrates of the township constitute the Board of Supervisors. If the repairs are not speedily made the matter will probably be investigated by the next grand jury and indictments may follow.

New Hanover Park.
There has been considerable talk within the last decade of years in advocacy of a city park, but thus far there have been no decided steps taken towards making the city more attractive and beautiful by the creation of any such place, and, from present appearances, it will be a long time before we shall have such a feature of advancement within our limits. The County Commissioners, however, although their limits are much circumscribed, have gone to work in earnest to beautify and make as attractive as possible the county property which lies within the city limits, and to this end have had the jail lot graded and cleared of all rubbish and have planted a grove of elm and maple trees—twenty-five in number—on the grounds. These are set out in rows, equidistant from each other, so that they will be in line, from whatever point of observation you may look. In a few years, if nothing should happen to them, these trees will form an excellent shade, besides giving an attractive appearance to the lot. A row of five trees has also been set out on the edge of the sidewalk in front of the jail, which in a few years will afford a fine shade, besides greatly beautifying the street in that locality. The place has been very appropriately named New Hanover Park. The drive way to the park from Princess street, at the Western end of the lot, has been graded and ballasted with the very best of material for a permanent and solid roadbed.
