The Grant family have bought a controlling interest in the Cosmopolitan Magazine. Colonel Fred Grant will be the business manager and his mother (Mrs. Gen. Grant) will superintend the publication of some historical matters in which her husband was a conspicuous actor. Mrs. Grant has already received \$400,000 from Gen. Grant's book and the publisher thinks she can count on an annual income of \$5,000 from it for many years yet.

It has generally been said that the largest share of the appropriations asked for public buildings would go to the South, but the Washington correspondent of the New York Times shows that it is a mistaken idea. The following is a summary of the buildings bill now before Congress: Eastern States 13 buildings, total cost \$1,521,000; Middle States 23 buildings, total cost \$3,315,000; Western States 60 buildings, total cost \$11,183,500; Southern States 48 buildings, total cost \$7,795,000; Territories 5 buildings, total cost \$1,180,000. Total number of buildings 149; total cost \$24,994,500.

Hanover Street.
We have been requested to call the attention of the city authorities to the necessity of grading, ballasting and in other respects improving Hanover street, from Fourth street to Nutt street. The cost of such improvements as are absolutely needed on that thoroughfare would not exceed \$200, which would be a mere trifle as compared to the benefits which would be derived if the work were done. It would open to public travel a good street, where there is now a range of sandhills that are almost impassable. Besides this the residents of that part of the city are almost completely shut out from the Southern part of the city, by reason of the blockade of Front, Second and Third streets, and as they pay their proportionate part of the city taxes, it is but right and just that their demands for good streets should be heeded. In the present condition of things Hanover street is one of the very worst in the city.

This would also make the safest, easiest and most convenient route by which to reach the Carolina Central Railroad depot, thereby avoiding the annoyance of crossing the railroad tracks on Nutt street, with the almost unceasing movement of cars and engines on that street. The grade from Fourth street to Nutt street could be made a light one, and it is a work that ought to be performed.

Lippincott's Monthly Magazine.
Lippincott's Magazine for March opens with a complete novel by Julia Magruder, "Honored in the Breach," which is full of a quiet, subdued interest with pleasant touches of humor and pathos. A remarkably clever article by Max O'Rell is entitled "From My Letter-Box," and presents a summary of the contents of anonymous and other letters received by the author of "John Bull and His Island" with humorous comments. "A Talk with a President's Son," the son being General John Tyler, now living in Washington, by Frank G. Carpenter, is full of historical interest in regard to the inner workings of the Tyler administration. The third instalment of Albion W. Tourgee's "With Gauge & Swallow" is subtitled "A Retainer in Cupid's Court," and turns upon an interesting question of marriage or no-marriage. There are poems by Charles Henry Phelps, Charlotte Fiske Bates, W. H. Hayne and Harrison S. Morris. The "One Hundred Prize Questions" are continued by a fresh instalment of twenty, and much curious and interesting information is conveyed in the editorial departments.

Thirty-Second Anniversary.
That gallant and venerable fire organization, Howard Relief Fire Engine Company No. 1, will celebrate on Tuesday next the 32d anniversary of its existence. The line of march will be from the Engine House up Fourth street to Princess, down Princess to Third, up Third to Chestnut, on Chestnut to Front, down Front to Nun, on Nun to Third, up Third to Dock and on Dock street to the Engine House. At 12 o'clock a reception will be given at the Engine House and a collation will be served, which will be attended by the firemen and invited guests and at night the Firemen's Ball in the Howard Hall will close the festivities of the day.

Cotton.
The receipts of cotton at this port for the week ended February 18th, 1888, foot up 2,060 bales as against 857 bales for the corresponding week last year; an increase of 1,203 bales. The receipts for the crop year to date foot up 163,610 bales as against 128,959 bales for the corresponding period last year; an increase of 34,651 bales.

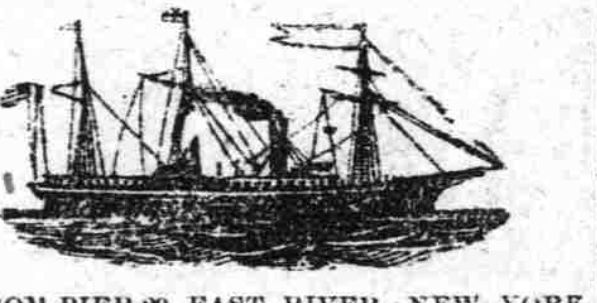
