 account for his paper.

The latest advices from Venezuela  
 are to the effect that the Venezue-  
 lans are expecting an armed expedi-  
 tion of the British to the gold  
 fields of the Yurnari, and that they  
 are preparing to resist the invasion  
 of their territory. The richness of  
 the gold mines in the disputed ter-  
 ritory is almost marvellous. There  
 are fourteen mines, and from the  
 Callao mine alone, during the past  
 twelve years, there have been taken  
 \$9,342,422.55. Every share of stock in  
 the mine, in 1882, paid \$3,080 in divi-  
 dends.

H. J. Bonfield, an Englishman,

 almost blocked up, owing to the up-  
 heaval wrought by an earthquake.

### The Fire Yesterday.

The alarm of fire was sounded yester-  
 day morning at 9:15 o'clock. It  
 came from the corner of Fourth and  
 Campbell streets, opposite Fourth  
 Street Market. The alarm was first  
 given by Mr. W. C. Munds, of Munds  
 Bros., who have a drug store on the  
 corner. Mr. Munds noticed first a  
 small stream of smoke issuing from  
 the ceiling, next to Mrs. S. J. Baker's  
 millinery store, which was quickly  
 succeeded by a dense volume pour-  
 ing from the crevices. He then gave  
 the alarm. The fire department  
 were quickly on hand and in a very  
 short time had the fire completely  
 under control. Mrs. Baker's store  
 was completely gutted and the stock  
 ruined by fire and water. Messrs.  
 Hand Bros., family grocers, in the  
 building next North, were damaged  
 considerably, altogether by water,  
 while Messrs. Munds Bros', drug  
 store, on the corner, escaped with a  
 very slight loss.

The fire seems to have started some-  
 where on the second floor of the  
 building, where Mrs. Baker resided,  
 but it is not known how it was caus-  
 ed. The family were absent at the  
 time, having left the house but a  
 short time previously and when the  
 alarm was sounded were at Dr. Free-  
 man's residence.

The insurance, it is said, will cover  
 all of the losses. Mrs. Baker is in-  
 sured in Messrs Atkinson and Man-  
 nings, Agency for \$3,000, in the Etna,  
 of Hartford and the Fire Association  
 of Philadelphia, \$1,500 in each; the  
 building in which is located Messrs  
 Munds, Bro's, drug store and Mrs.  
 Baker's store, the property of Dr.  
 John H. Freeman, is insured for \$850  
 in the Hibernian, of New Orleans,  
 Messrs Atkinson and Manning  
 Agents; Messrs Hand Bros., who own  
 the building in which their store  
 is located, have \$350 on the building  
 in the Hamburg Bremen, and \$500  
 on the stock, in the Virginian Fire  
 & Marine, both represented here by  
 Messrs Smith & Boatwright; and  
 Mrs. W. E. McFadgen, who had  
 household goods in the Freeman  
 building, has \$500 in the Rochester  
 German, Messrs Smith & Boatwright  
 Agents.
