Hon. Wharton J. Green is being spoken of by his friends for the nomination to Congress from the Third District. A correspondent in a Fayetteville Observer puts in a strong plea in his behalf and Col. Green, if he makes up his mind to become a candidate, will probably go into convention with a strong following.

A big bone, which local physicians of Carson, Nev., say is a portion of the leg bone of a man, was recently found near Genoa, Nev. It was two feet long, and at the point where it joined the knee was eight inches across, or five times the usual size. If the man who owned the bone was built in proportion he must have been about twenty-five feet high. An active search is being made for the rest of the skeleton.

On the 18th inst. Oxford is to have a jubilation over the completion of the Oxford & Clarksville Railroad. The invitation committee announces that "one hundred of the financial giants of New York, Baltimore and Richmond" will go "in special palace cars to visit the home and nursery of golden tobacco—a very wonderful land!" An "immense procession and trades display," and a "free barbecue to feed the thousands," are also promised. Governor Seales, Governor Lee and Judge Fowle will serve up the oratorical part of the affair.

Goldwin Smith, in a recent article calls attention to a fact overlooked by Americans, that a strong French nationality is growing up in Canada. New France, that is the Province of Quebec, instead of being anglicized, is growing more intensely French than ever. It is rapidly shouldering the English-speaking people out of that Province, the British population of the City of Quebec being already reduced to 6,000, while the East towns, once thoroughly British, are now fast becoming French. The connection with France as a mother country has of late been assiduously renewed.

The prohibition people of this State have decided to assert themselves during the campaign of this year, and have issued a call for a State Convention to be held in Greensboro on May 16th next. The call states the business of the Convention to be the election of twenty-six delegates and as many alternates to attend the National Prohibition Convention to be held at Indianapolis June 6, the selection of eleven candidates for Presidential electors, the nomination of a full set of candidates for State offices, the election of a State executive committee, and the full and complete organization of the State.
