ABSTACT OF SERMONS.

Eternal Punishment and the Nature of Eternal Punishment Preached by Rev. F. W. E. Peschau, Pastor of St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church, Sunday, April 16, 1888.

Rev. F. W. E. Peschau has been asked to publish the two discourses he preached on last Sunday on the subject previously announced. It affords us pleasure to publish the following outlines thereof. It is, of course, impossible to do the sermons justice by giving so short a sketch thereof.

The text of the morning sermon was Matth, xxv, 46, "And these shall go away into everlasting punishment."

These are the words of the son of God. You, as Christian people, l. as a Christian pastor, must either receive and believe them, or reject them. It is a remarkable fact that the New Testament which brings us the gladdest news of God's mercy in Christ, also brings us the clearest, strongest, and most numerous lessons on eternal punishment. And, not only this, but these lessons come not from the apostles but from Christ Himself. as if Divinity in its wisdom was unwilling to have even the grandest and best human agencies to announce or set forth this important doctrine. Afterfirst considering some erroneous opinions, objections, etc. the following points which are some of the leading ones from the many resented, were discussed. We will not discuss punishment but its being everlasting. As Christians we believe the words of the text.

1. Because we even believe that matter is eternal. Matter may change its form but is indestructible. If matter has this characteristic, surely God would not make the soul, which in every way is superior to matter, lack the essential property of ever existing.

Our Saviour in speaking of Judas says, "good were it for that man if he had never been born." Surely this means that this was because the punishment to come upon him was eternal and that he could not escape from it and therefore not to be born at all, was preferable to the punishment of the guilty, because it is eternal.

2. Because, it is following out the law and order of things in this world. The word of God is the basis of human law, there are puntheir life for violating human law, the Divine la « therefore which deals with eternal things must attach eternal punishment.

God would be dealing unjustly toward those who do sincerely try to love and serve Him. If punishment hereafter is limited, why have punishment at all on earth? Why not do away with law and order? Then the murderer would be the best man and the drunkard the wisest man and the licentious the happiest man. If we can think ourselves into eternity at all, we can reason from analogy that its laws applied will be eternal.

3. History is full of references to it. Even infidels have spoken of this doctrine, in their histories, and in their articles on retribution have recognized it.

4. The Church in all ages has accepted these words just as our Lord uttered them. This is proyen (I) by the writings of the early Church Fathers, or in the opinions of the leading men of God in early times, from the days of Barnabas, the companion friend and fellow-workman with Paul, down to days when the Church formed her creeds.

The term in the New Testament aloon occurs 108 times, and always means eternal. Even the Greek classical authors use it in their writings in this sense. the right meaning, as ai means ever, and oon means existing, together ever-existing.

6. It is taught by contrast. In so very many places we find the same word referring to life also, as in our text, "These shall go away into everlasting punishment but the right-eous into life eterhal." Eternal life and eternal death are thus often mentioned in contrast in the same passage. If life, blessedness and re-ward are eternal, then also must suffering and punishment be eternal. 7. Our Saviour taught it in so many of His parables. The foolish virgins, the servants punished, Lazarus and Dives, all bring it before our minds in strong words. Abraham plainly tells Dives; that there is a great gulf fixed. This teaches the impossibility to escape. So too Dives prayed Abraham to send Lazarus to his brethren. He did not ask Abraham to send him as he knew there was no release for him.

8. Would God allow His Son to suffer the shame, agony and death upon the Cross, if it would not save men from eterlasting punishment? Surely there can be but one answer to this. If God were too merciful to punish a creature for gross and shameful crimes. He would be all too merciful to allow the Son, of His for sale at love to suffer so, His mercy would begin in the Divine household.

The Bible plainly teaches, "For God so loved the world, that He gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him might not perish, but have everlasting life," This perish certainly does not mean to save from death, for all men die, it means it can mean only, perish forever. From this may God deliver us. God has given us all that is necessary to win us for Heaven and may we reach it and have eternal life.

10. Everlasting punishment is also taught by the fact that it was prepared for the devil and his angels. Had it been better and wisest, God would have destroyed the devil and his angels. The fact that He did not proves that He cannot from the very nature of things destroy spirits If He banished the devil and his angels into everlasting suffering, for whom Christ did not die, how much more will He not punish those who have been thus honored and helped by God.
