The Republic of Chile is going largely into railroad building. Two lines are building across the continent to connect Chile with the Argentine Republic. These are being constructed by private companies with the help of Government subsidies. But the Government manages the internal system itself, and to this it is now about to add .800 of \$17,000,000. Most of the Chilian railroads have been built by American contractors, and at the Chilian legation in Washington the plans of the proposed new roads, as drawn up by open to the study of Americans who read," but "that he who reads may wish to make bids for them. The Chilian Government pays cash and evidently means business, for it offers to pay contractors for the new roads in monthly or bi-monthly pay- ment. ments, but exacts that if a road is not built in the time specifed, the contractor shall forfeit fifty cents per \$1,000 of the amount of his contract for every day's delay.

The letter just received in London from Emin Pasha gives a final assurance of the purpose not to be "rescued," in the sense of being car his life. In this respect Stanley's second mission of search will be singularly like his first, Dr. Livingstone having also declined to leave his labors as the penalty of being 'found." In a letter from Wadelai, written four months before his last, Emin Pasha had also declared that he could not desist from his task, after having "won the confidence of the people and sown the seed of a splendid future civilization." He has now been about twelve years in Africa, and for a large part of the time has had charge of the equatorial regions, of which he is still Governor. He has successfully fought slavery, has established stations, has taught the natives agriculture and some of the mechanic arts, and now is content to stay with them, only asking that a road for commerce by caravan shall be opened to the coast. It is, of course, obvious that no information could be given of Stanley, since the letter was written in the middle of August. Still, it is in one way reassuring as to Stanley, since it shows that the absence of news from him for weeks or months longer would not imply failure to reach Wadelai.

If the plans of the Niagara River Hydraulic Tunnel, Power and Sewer Company are carried out as ar. ranged at the present time the mighty power of the Falls of Niagara will be utilized for the general benefit of mankin 1 and for the financial enrichment of the stock holders in the enterprise. Its pur pose is to utilize the power of the Niagara River by constructing a subterranean tunnel from the water level below the falls, about 200 feet under the high bank of the river, extending through the rock to the Upper Niagara River a point about one mile above the falls, where a head of 120 feet is obtained. The tunnel is then to extend, parallel with the shore of the river, one and one-half miles at an average depth of 100 feet below the surface of the earth and at a distance of about 400 feet from the navigable water of the river with which it is to be connected by means of conduits or lateral tunnels. The scheme is one of gigantic proportions, and includes the establishment of innumerable mills at the point where the power is obtained, as well as distributing the power through electric wires to other centres, where it can be used in lieu of steam or local water-power. The power is to be obtained from the conduits leading to the main tunnel, and not from the tunnel itself to the tunnel 100 feet below the earth's surface. In these wells will turned by the weight of the water in the wells. It is said that the horse-power thus obtained will be sufficient to accommodate 238 mills of 500-horse power each, or 119,000 horse-power in all, which is the es. timate of the engineers of the capacity of the tunnel proposed to be built. This power would be greater than all the other water power of the country combined. The estimated cost of construction is \$3,000,-000, and enough patronage has al-

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
