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

A Boston special to the New York Tribune says: "Edward Burgess has been busy the last year, and this summer thirty new yachts designed by him will be put into the water, probably the largest fleet ever turn ed out by one naval architect in this country in a single season. Nearly three-fourths of the list are keel vessels. Some of the hitherto fast yachts nay lose their prestige this year by sailing against some of the new boats. The Shadow had no new first-class rival until last year in the Papoose, but this season she will have to meet at least four, and it is a question if she will be able to hold her place at the head of her class."

Steamers landing at Cabinda, a ittle port north of the Congo, are often met by a young white man who appears to be in the egg and poultry business. This young man is one of Bishop Taylor's missionaries, and when he appears at the landing with his chicken coops he is carrying out the "self-supporting" feature of the Bishop's enterprise. He supports himself nicely, but finds that it would take a good deal of capital to start a school at present, as none of the natives, in their present state of mind, can be induced to send their children to school, unless they are paid for it.

The official returns of the active militia of the Dominion show that they number 38,000 men, which is a slight increase over the strength of the previous year. It appears, however, from the official report that only 20,000 of the number, or little more than half, were authorized to drill during the year, the appropria tion for this purpose being about a quarter of a million dollars, or about one-fifth of the total ordinary annual cost of the militia, exclusive of extra service like that which was incurred in putting down Riel's rebellion. It is also to be observed that Canada does not maintain a regular army, although besides the British garrisons she has some useful military schools. The year's drilling of the militia now extends through twelve days, and this period may hereafter be increased. It would appear that the Dominion militia is in rather a better condition of efficiency than is sometimes sup-


