Mayor Fowler's Message

Mayor Fowler submitted his first annual report to the Board last night. It was a lengthy but comprehensive and interesting document. We would be glad to publish it in full but it is too lengthy for our columns. It shows a city debt, bonded, of \$568,900, with an offset in the sinking fund of \$80,972.21. The receipts from all sources for the fiscal year were \$317,217.10, the largest collection ever made in any year, and the expenditures were \$312,906.-

The receipts from the City Court amounted to \$2,496.30. The iron bridge on Fourth street cost \$16,-113.18, and to meet this, in part, a new loan of \$10,000 was negotiated. The Mayor recommends that Fifth street be beautified and macada mized. The city is in an excellent sanitary condition, but the Mayor recommends a sewage system to cost not more than \$80,000. He also recommends that the Legislature be petitioned to erect the necessary wharves and buildings for quarantine purposes at the mouth of the river. The Fire Department is highly complimented for its efficiency, &c., &c.
