On Tuesday next after the first Monday in November, the 6th of the month, the people of North Carolina will vote for electors of President and Vice-President of the United States; State Executive officers; three Associate Justices of the Supreme Court; Representatives in Congress; county officers, (except the Constitution increasing the num There are to be seven ballot-boxes, into which ballots will be deposited as follows:

1. Eleven Electors of President and Vice-President.

2. Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, Attorney-General and Pittsburg Gazette. Superintendent of Public Instruc-

3. Associate Justice Supreme Court-to fill vacancy caused by death, and two Associate Justices of Supreme Court to fill original va- child from pain, and the little cher-

4. Representatives in the 51st Congress, in each of the nine Congressonal Districts.

5. Register of Deeds, Coroners Treasurer, Surveyor and Sheriff, in each county.

6. Constable in each township.

7. Amendment to Constitution relative to the Supreme Court.

The judicial ticket will distinguish between the candidate to fill the unexpired term of the late Associate Justice Ashe and the two candidates to be commissioned Associate Justices only in the event of the ratification by the people of the amendment to be voted on at this election. The chairmen of the State committees of the political parties will agree upon the formula for this distinction.

Here is one of the best arguments we have yet seen in favor of tariff revision. It is from the Raleigh News and Observer. It is simply unanswerable:

If a citizen holds a bond for \$1,000, bearing 4 per cent. interest and due in 1907, that is, with twenty years yet to run, and the maker wants to take it up, what would the maker offer for it?

We suppose he would say, money is worth 6 per cent., and as the interest on this note is only 4 per cent., its present value is about \$900. At farthest he would say, I will pay the principal and stop the interest. Would be offer to pay \$1,270 for the note? Not unless he was insane.

Well, the case is now presented just in that way. The Government owes a lot of notes due in 1907 for \$1,000 each, bearing 4 per cent. interest. The holders of these bonds ask \$1,270 for them.

Congress and the law say that the surplus money of the Government must be used in buying in these notes. The Democrats say, stop the surplus, so that the Government will not have any money to pay in that way. The Republicans say: Oh, no; we are not willing to stop the surplus. Buy the bonds." That

is the way it stands.

Within one month the government has paid out \$21,665,500 for bonds amounting to \$18,088,000. That is, the government in one month has made a present to the bondholders of more than \$3,500,000. In a year rate make a present to the bondholders of \$40,000,000. In ten years,
