Flag Presented but no Excursion.

The Wilmington-Light Infantry did not carry out the full programme which had been laid out for to-day. The new flag, however, was presented to the Company, at the Armory. There were not many present besides the Company as it was not thought that the presentation would take place to-day but there having already been several postponements it was decided best to carry out that part of the programme. There were only four ladies present. The Company was drawn up, in full uniform, and Rev. Dr. Carmichael, in a very neat and pleasant little address, presented, on behalf of the ladies who had made it, the beautiful flag. It was received on behalf of the Company by Colonel John L. Cantwell, in a few felicitous remarks, and then it was turned over to the keeping of Color-bearer Perdew. The flag is of silk, blue and white, of the same size as the old one, with gold fringe, and gold tassels and cord and surmounted by a gold spear, jeweled.
