The Democratic party of the United States has honored itself in honoring Judge Thurman. It is a happy combination, that of Cleveland and Thurman. It represents a union of the old and the new, the past and the present. Judge Thurman is a Southerner by birth. He was born in Lynchburg, Va., but removed to Ohio when but six years old. He was born Nov. 13, 1813, and is therefore now in his 75th year. He is still hearty, hale and vigorous. He was a representative in Congress from Ohio when he was called thence to the Supreme Bench of the State, of which he became Chief Justice in 1854. He served two full terms in the U.S. Senate, from 1869 to 1881, and it is his record there as one of a weak minority, the brave stand he maintained at all times in defense of the Constitution, which earned him the proud sobriquet which he has won, that of "the noblest Roman of them all."


