A botanist thus describes how the leaves change their color in autumn. He ridicules the belief that frost has anything to do with it: "The green matter in the tissue of a leaf is composed of two colors—red and blue. When the sap ceases to flow in the autumn, and the natural growth of the tree ceases, oxidation of the tissue takes place. Under certain conditions the green of the leaf changes to red; under different conditions it takes on a yellow or brown tint. This difference in color is due to the difference in combination of the original constituents of the green tissue, and to the varying conditions of climate, exposure and soil. A dry, cold climate produces more brilliant foliage than one that is damp and warm. This is the reason that our American autumns are so much more gorgeous than those of England."

A committee of the faculty of Harvard College has just submitted to that body a report on the whole subject of athletics and athletic sports in college, which is in the main very favorable to their encouragement. Certain objections brought against them are fully considered by the committee. "With regard to the allegation that they are not favorable to the health of the students, the committee concludes emphatically to the contrary. It says, also, that athletic sports "do not seriously interfere" with attendance on college courses; that participation in them lowers neither the standing of those who take part in them nor the general standing of the college, and that they have in the main "a good moral influence" upon those who take part in them and who witness them. In the expenses which they involve no serious objection is found. About 400 students contribute less than \$10 each in a year, and more than 280 contribute nothing. Those who contribute more freely can afford it. The committee find abuses to be corrected and makes suggestions for extending the facilities for exercise and sports at the college and improving athletic management. Many interesting facts are tabulated in support of the committee's views, and the report will do much toward clearing up the misinformation and misconceptions that prevail on the subject.

The illness of the Brazilian Emperor recalls what he has done, and encouraged to be done for his Empire. Twenty years ago Brazil had nine insignificant cotton manufactories, all together having 335 spindles. There are now in that country forty-six such manufactories, five of which alone have 40,000 spindles. They make yearly 83,000,000 yards of cotton goods. This is but one item, which is paralleled in every direction. The country has also progressed in agricultural production quite as remarkably as in manufactures. The Argentine Republic in South America alone has kept pace with Brazil. Thirty years ago Dom Pedro was in a struggle with all sorts of conservatism and bigotry, which resisted progress. He persisted in importing machinery and tools and ideas, and has lived long enough to know that he has triumphed. The crowning result is the recent abolition of slavery.
