A Horrible and Fatal Accident. Capt. William M. Swann, a highly esteemed citizen of this place, met with a sudden and shocking death this morning. It was about 7:30 o'clock, and Capt. Swann, who was in the employ of Mr. C. B. Mallette, a lumber shipping merchant, was at the freight depot of the W. C. & A. R. R. to attend to the reception and shipping of a lot of lumber from Maysville, S. C., then on the cars and destined to be stowed on board the Schr. W. H. Hopkins, lying at the railroad wharf, and receiving cargo for Philadelphia. Capt. Swann was standing near the track, on the inner side of a curve, as the train was being moved down. A flat car loaded with scantling, 8x8 inches, had one piece longer than the rest, and this projecting front was driven against the car ahead of it as the car came around the curve and in this way the pressure forced out one of the stancheons and before Capt. Swann could dream of danger he was crushed to the earth with nearly all of the entire carload on him: His poor body was badly broken and there is no doubt death was instantaneous. The spirit had fled before Stmr Queen of St. John's, those who reached the spot could
