

THE N. C. STATE GUARD.

First Day of the Encampment at Wrightsville.
The troops are all now safely in camp and the regular routine of camp life was begun to-day. The first troop train was that which arrived here yesterday afternoon on the Carolina Central road. This train consisted of 17 coaches, with twelve companies, averaging 40 men each. These companies were the Maxton Guards, Lumber Bridge Light Infantry, Fayetteville Independent Light Infantry, Guilford Guards, Forsyth Riflemen, Monroe Light Infantry, Hornet's Nest Riflemen, Southern Stars, Dallas Light Infantry, Irell Blues, Advance Guards and Granville Grays. These did not stop in the city but went immediately to the Sound. They had been preceded by the Wilmington Light Infantry, as reported by us yesterday.

Later the following companies arrived on the W. & W. R. R. and were taken to camp before dark: The Goldsboro Rifles, Sampson Light Infantry, Edgecombe Guards, Greenville Guards, Washington Light Infantry, Pasquotank Rifles, Scotland Neck Mounted Riflemen, Warrenton Guards, Governor's Guards, Durham Light Infantry, Reidsville Light Infantry, Reidsville Rifles, Asheville Light Infantry and Richville Rifles.

At 8 o'clock this morning Adjutant General Jones, accompanied by his staff, the Fayetteville Light Infantry, the Hornet's Nest Riflemen, the Reidsville Light Infantry, the bands of the Third and Fourth Regiments, and a number of officers of the companies and spectators proceeded to formally open the Encampment. Adjutant General Jones read the following general order:

GENERAL ORDERS NO. 11.
I. By direction of His Excellency, Governor A. M. Scales, Commander-in-Chief, I hereby assume command of the troops assembled at Camp Pender under General Order No. 7.
II. The officers of the general staff will discharge the duties of their respective offices.
III. This Encampment is intended

to be a camp of instruction, and a cordial co-operation of all officers is earnestly invoked.

After prayer by Rev. J. Carmichael, D. D., Chaplain of the Second Regiment, the band played "Hail Columbia," and "Dixie," during which the National colors were run up, and Camp Pender was formally established.

The following General Orders, issued this morning, will govern all the companies and also serve as a programme each day during the Encampment:

II. The morning drill will be restricted exclusively to the School of the Battalion; the afternoon to the Skirmish Drill, unless otherwise specially ordered by the officer commanding the camp.

III. Each Regimental Commander will assemble his company officers at the appointed hour each day, at regimental headquarters for theoretical instruction in tactics and guard duty.

IV. Company commanders will, each day at the appointed hour, assemble the non-commissioned officers of their respective companies for theoretical instruction in guard duty.

V. Regimental commanders will give special attention to the instruction of the troops under their command in Guard Duty, and will require this duty to be performed with thorough accuracy and exactness in every particular.

VI. Each company is expected to be already drilled in company movement, and there will be no stated drills in the school of the company; but company drills may be allowed by regimental commanders outside the regular drill hours upon application of the company commander.

VII. Drills will be executed in fatigue dress. The full dress should be worn only at Guard Mounting and Dress Parade.

VIII. All troops, except those on duty, will be permitted to leave camp each day between 11 a. m. and 2 p. m. without special permit. Permits to leave during other hours for less than twenty-four hours, will be granted by regimental commanders; all other leaves of absence will be granted by the officer commanding the camp, upon written application.

IX. The troops will parade in the City of Wilmington on Tuesday the 24th; the Review by the Governor will take place on Wednesday the 25th. The troops will be given a general holiday on Thursday the 26th.
X. Troops are charged to use the tents and other public property in their possession with the greatest care. Tents must not be marked, defaced or abused, and all commanding officers will be held to strict accountability for any defacement or injury to such property.
