This can be seen from the royal reception accorded on his arrival, as also from the many public receptions held in his honor.

He will return to Charlotte this evening, and a reception will be held in his honor at the residence of Dr. O'Donoghue from 8 to 10 p. m., where all who wish to pay him their respects are cordially invited.

THE N. C. STATE GUARD.

Second Day at the Encampment.

The Encampment at Wrightsville is at this time nearing the end of its second day. A REVIEW reporter made the rounds of the camp this morning and found everything in peaceful array. No blockaders were seen off the coast last night, the Yankee fleet have not yet hove in sight and the sand-fiddlers were industriously pursuing their avocations on the same spot where erstwhile stood the works of the indefatigable boilers of salt water who used to supply the people of the Confederacy with much of that needed commodity, salt. The list of casualties in yesterday's engagements were completed and the score of losses on our side compared with the tally of those under the Surgeons' care in the hospital or who couched the salt breezes under cover of a large tent in involuntary retirement.

There was an immense throng present yesterday at the dress parade, among whom were a great many ladies from the city and the Sounds and the novel and interesting spectacle was a treat to all. The appointments and movements were all in thorough accord with the requirements of military usage and etiquette.

A recollection of the troublous days of 1862 is recalled. Very near the Encampment, in fact just across the pike, right at the entrance of Mrs. Wm. A. Wright's place, Maj. John W. Cameron, Chief Quartermaster of the Department of North Carolina, established a camp during the late Summer of 1862, when the yellow fever prevailed in Wilmington. The late Capt. C. W. Styron was A. Q. M. with Maj. Cameron and the late Capt. I. B. Grainger, afterwards an A. Q. M. also, was then Chief Clerk in Capt. Styron's office. There were a dozen or more of us in camp. The fever was raging violently in Wilmington and we would come up to the town every morning and go down to camp every afternoon, sleeping and taking breakfast and supper in camp. We all witnessed many scenes of misery here during our daily visits to town but it is not our purpose to speak here of these. On that day there was a big excitement all along the coast. One Sunday we saw the Princess, a beautiful yacht owned by Miss Amoret Bradley, (afterwards Mrs. Cameron), which was one of the largest and swiftest boats at Wrightsville in ante bellum days, manned by a party of refugee slaves, sail out of the Sound, and through Masonboro Inlet, and then direct its course towards one of the blockading squadrons, which was cruising in the offing, about two miles distant. Through our glasses we saw the steamer slow up, then stop and receive the runaways on board and finally hook the yacht to its davits, haul it up and then sail away. This was the last seen of the beautiful Princess, the pride and delight of the Summer sailors at Wrightsville and her after fate has always remained a mystery to us.

Cut with a Fish Knife.

A cutting affray occurred this morning at the Encampment between a colored camp follower of the Washington Light Infantry and one of the servants of the Wilmington Light Infantry. The latter remonstrated with the former for cleaning fish on the pump when he was renarded with a cut from a knife on the hands of the fish cleaner, which cut a deep gash in his neck and nearly severed his ear. The injured man was attended to and his assailant took to the woods and escaped. We could not learn the names.
