The published descriptions tell all about her mirrors, her stained glass, her upholstery and the comforts of her state rooms, but not a word about the number of life boats swinging from her davits, or their capacity for carrying the whole 2,000 people safely through a stormy sea. > same overwhelmingly Republican House of Representatives, presided over by James G. Blaine, that passed a free salt bill by a more than three-fourths vote, there was introduced on the same March 13, 1871, a joint resolution to put coal on the free list. There was no hesitation about that measure, either. By a vote of 130 to 57 it was decided, so far as the House could do it, to abol sh all import duties on coal. Again the Ohio Republican members were found voting together for this free trade measure to strike at the "infant industry" of Ohio coal mining. The Senate objected, as a matter of course, but in 1872a bill passed both Houses reducing the duty on coal from \$1.25 to 75 cents per ton. Were the Republicans of the House who passed a free coal measure in 1871 'free traders"? Did the Republicans of both branches of Congress who in 1872 actually cut down the protective duty on coal 40 per cent. 'strike a deadly blow at American industry"? If not, why not?

Three members of the Garfield Cabinet are now in Europe. Robert Lincoln is in Switzerland, winding up his holiday trip, with his daughter; Mr. Blaine arrived in London from Scotland on Sunday evening; Windom, Garfield's secretary of the treasury, is in London, and expects to return to America within the next ten days. He is largely inter ested in Northern railway lands. He has been very successful in placing his financial interests in the 4th London market. He made a large sth fortune in Mexican railways, and is said to have made enough millions to console him for being out of politics. Mr. Windom thinks that the Republicans will win this year. He hints that it is possibly an error that the Republicans made the issue at Chicago free whiskey and tobacco, but at the same time he does not think that the party will lose any of its regular members by that, and that there will be a positive gain from the Prohibition element. Out and out Prohibitionists are opposed to taxing whiskey, upon the ground that it makes the Government a party to licensing what they call an infamous traffic.

Every once in a while we discover that some mountain peak must give up the undeserved distinction con ferred upon it of holding its head higher than all other summits. For a long time Mount Chimborazo was supposed to be the highest moun. tain in the world until, in the progress of the Himalayan surveys, Mount Everest was found to overtop it. Four years ago W. W. Graham, who has been higher above the sea than any other mountain climber, asserted that Everest must yield the palm of supremacy to an unwanted peak about seventy miles from it. We long supposed that Mount St. Elias was the loftiest mountain of North America, but we now know that that honor belongs to Mount Wrangel, which is about 500 feet higher than St. Elias. It was also supposed that Mount Kilima-Njaro, 18,700 feet high, was the greatest elevation in Africa, but now comes Count Teleki, the Hungarian traveller, with the assertion that this mountain must play second fiddle to Mount Kenia, about 200 miles north. He is the only man who has yet ascended Kenia. The surprising news he sends home from Africa will not be accepted unreservedly until he supplies the data.



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
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
