upon the action of the committee which has agreed to report favor-Gen. Lee, the Representative from the Alexandria district, known as the "Lee Pure Food bill." This bill seems to be leveled directly at one article, and that is lard, into which a Southern product, pure cotton seed oil, is frequently found to be an ingredient. Hon. C. W. McClammy, Representative from our adjoining district, the Third, is a member of the committee and he opposed the bill. He is reported as being "unutterably, unchangeably, and eternally opposed to the Lard bill which was simply intended to bene fit one set of mannfacturers by tax ing another and in doing it pile up more unnecessary internal revenue. He favors general pure food legislation, provided the proper constitutional limits are respected."

We have not seen the bill agreed upon by the committee, but we shrewdly suspect that its principal effect will be in boosting the lard market and making consumers pay more money for the same article than they now do. There is another effect, however, which will surely result, if the bill becomes a law, and that will be to add to the already big surplus in the overflowing treasury, for there will be a "lardine" or something of that kind manufactured under the provisions of the bill and the sacred influence of an infernal internal revenue tax. But cotton seed oil, which is the only decent ingredient besides hog fat in lard, is a Southern product and must therefore be taxed for all it is worth. We want to see all of these adulterations choked out and we want to see the "adulterers" held up to the public view but it seems to us that the right way to do this is not to pile up any more of the odious war taxes.

As for Maj. McClammy we glory in his spunk in talking plainly and to the point. He is a North Carolina Democrat and believes in doing all he can to promote the principles of his party here at home. In this we are with him. This is not Republican doctrine but pure Democratic gospel, coming down to us from two successive conventions, as the solemn and deliberate convictions of the Democratic party in North Carolina.

Never has there been such a crowd in Chatham and never has more enthusiasm been displayed anywhere. The procession formed at Court House Square and marched to Kelvin Grove, where the speaking was had. Senator Vance spoke first, dwelling in most eloquent terms on the splendor of Southern valor as displayed on the field during the war, and he was followed by Senator Ransom, who spoke in the same glorious strain and in his usual superb manner. It is seldom that our two noble Senators have been met together at any North Carolina gathering; never before have they been together at a Confederate reunion. The meeting them both today by their multitude of friends charged. here has been a pleasure beyond expression and one appreciated by the

old soldiers in the highest degree. There were twenty companies represented in the reunion, and Col. J. R. Lane, of Chatham, was chief marshal of the parade. The SilerCity band furnished the music for the occasion and elicited deserved encomiums on every hand. Moore county was represented as well as Chatham. and so were Randolph, Guilford and Durham. 
