The following are some of the most marked featares of the month of September, during past years: "Highest temperature, 95 degrees in 1875 and 1876; lowest, 42 degrees in 1887. Clear days occur 1 in every 3; cloudy days 1 in 4. It rains I day in 3, with an average daily rainfall of .24 of an inch. The greatest daily rainfall was 7.30 inches on the 10th, in 1883.


