When the convention to organize the Third party in Stanly county met in Albemarle last week, only one man was present, and he elected himself president, vice president, secretary, treasurer and executive committee. It is not improbable that he will go still further and appoint himself elector at large for Stanly county.—Charlotte Chronicle.

Is his name Charles R. Jones?

The Republicans of Wake county held their convention last Saturday and nominated a full ticket. Judge Russell's "savages" formed a large part of those present. In fact, there were very few white men present and about all of those were on the stage. They didn't like to mix up too much with "the herd." The "savages" were awarded the assistant secretaryship of the convention and one place on the ticket. But they will all be allowed to vote for the white men, just the same.

It is possible, and even probable, that the question of war or peace between this country and England may hinge upon the election to be held in November. It is for the people to say which it shall be. The Republican party, through its majority in the Senate, made a pretty bold declaration in its rejection of the fisheries treaty. It is to be Cleveland and peace or Harrison and war. Which will the people of this happy and prosperous country choose?

The Republicans sought to make party capital, and to alienate the Irish vote, by declaring that Mr. Cleveland was in direct sympathy with British policy. This soap bubble has been exploded into a thousand invisible fragments by the President's message on the fisheries question. The Republicans in the Senate and the Republicans in the country at large have seen this cherished illusion slip from them and there is not now left a square inch of solid ground under their feet. The Irishman are delighted with the message and they will vote for Cleveland.

"Cleveland's Ten Strike—The Republican Party in its Death Throes" is the plain and significant heading to the leader in yesterday's New York Herald's editorial columns. That paper says:

Mr. Cleveland's message on the fishery question is a State paper worthy of Washington or Bismarck. It has the originality, the courage of genius. It is the act of a strong, patriotic man who has a purpose and goes toward it. The ground is cut clean from under the Republican party.

The situation is clear. The President is the mouthpiece of the national will. The Senate, co-ordinate with the Executive as a treaty making power, has annihilated the fishery treaty, which secured to the United States the advantages possible to the resources of diplomacy. As nothing remains for diplomacy, the President's duty is to carry out the will of the nation. There are but two alternatives, reprisals against Canada or war with England.

As the President justly says, "the plan of retaliation, if entered upon, should be thorough and vigorous." Should war ensue—well, this is what the Republicans intended in the Senate, if they intended anything. Mr. Cleveland follows them to the logic of their own conclusions.

It is well to remember that we are taking perilous steps. We have no doubt that Mr. Edmunds, Mr. Everts and Mr. Hoar and their colleagues are correct, then the United States has coolly, deliberately made up its mind to have a war with England under a few thousand dollars' worth of codfish.

The attitude of the Republican party, as shown by the course of the Senate on the fisheries question, confirms this criticism. The Republican party, born amid fire, sword and civil war, thriving only so far as it represented State centralization and military despotism, enters upon this new policy as its natural, inevitable trend. The Democratic party, thriving amid peace and good will to men, has given the nation its freedom and prosperity. So that while the issue of retaliation or war is presented to the people as alterna- tives of a peaceful policy with Canada, it remains one for the people to decide. Happily the decision will be made in November.

A Gala Day.

A Pender county correspondent writes us as follows of a very pleasant picnic had at Willard last Thursday: "On the 23d day of August, at Willard, was held the grand- est picnic that it has ever been the pleasure of your correspondent to attend. Beneath the ambrageous folds of the wide-spreading oaks such as methinks Titians reclined beneath when he warbled his love plaints to his Daphne, the chivalry and beauty of Pender and Duplin assembled, bent upon festivity, and right royally did they succeed in "chasing the hours with flying feet." There was a commodious platform, good music and the devotees of Terpsichore made old and young hearts glad. Our clever sheriff E. M. Johnson, always a prince among men, as did many others, put the 'big pot in the little one,' and regaled 700 or 800 people with a bountiful repast that was fit for the gods. This writer heard a universal expression of opinion to the effect that this was a red letter day in the annals of Pender county. There was no politics in this affair and I warrant the assertion that there was not a single jar to mar this most recherche affair."

September Weather.

The weather chart for September, issued by Mr. F. P. Chaffee, in charge of the Signal Office, which is computed from seventeen years' observations, shows that the weather during that month is very changeable, with sudden and decided changes in temperature, though with a tendency to rather warmer between the 5th and 9th, becoming gradually cooler towards the latter part of the month. The following are some of the most marked features of the month of September, during past years: "Highest temperature, 95 degrees in 1875 and 1876; lowest, 42 degrees in 1887. Clear days occur 1 in every 3; cloudy days 1 in 4. It rains 1 day in 3, with an average daily rainfall of .34 of an inch. The greatest daily rainfall was 7.30 inches on the 10th, in 1883. The average velocity of wind is six miles per hour from the northeast. The following are some of the high winds that have blown during the month in question: Fifty miles, from southeast on 25th, in 1874; 31 miles, from south on 19th, in 1875; 56 miles, from northwest on 17th, in 1870; 30 miles, from southeast on 12th, in 1878; 64 miles, from west on 9th, in 1881; 30 miles, from southeast on 11th, in 1883.

Indications.

For North Carolina, local rains and clearing weather; on Tuesday night cooler weather.

Adjourned Until To-Morrow.

The Hewlett boys came in to-day with five cart loads of fine mullets, taken to-day off Masonboro beach. They say they could have got a hundred barrels but for the sharks, which were in great force. There were about fifty shark holes in the seine. The fish are running well now and if there is no northeaster to drive them back it is probable that the catch for the balance of this week will be very fine.
