We will learn a good deal, after awhile, on a subject as to which the large majority of the American people are now profoundly ignorant—to-wit: our relations with Canada.

The following is from the New York Star: Many facts are coming to light that go to show how much more effective will be the retaliation suggested by the President than that authorized by existing law.

The Canadians export large quantities of fish to the West Indies. Cuba imposes a duty of fifty-six cents per quintal on Canadian fish, but admits fish from the United States free.

Since January, 1886, because of the termination by President Arthur of the Treaty of Washington, the United States has again collected duties on Canadian fish, and the Canadians fell back on their claims under the treaty of 1818.

They therefore, at the same time, to continue the enjoyment of privileges not granted them by that treaty, but allowed them through the courtesy of the United States. They, therefore, shipped fish in bond to New York for export, and thus escaped the American duty, and since their fish was shipped from New York, they were admitted to Cuba free, as American fish.

This was rendered possible through the legislation permitting Canada to transport goods in bond through the United States without any interference from our customs officers.

The existing retaliation bill does not withdraw this privilege, but the legislation asked for by President Cleveland would put an immediate stop to this practice and prevent the Canadians from obtaining by a trick the advantages belonging to people in the United States by virtue of a provision in our treaty with Spain.

A correspondent, writing of the smoke nuisance in Chicago, says: "There are the most rigid prohibitive smoke ordinances here and end less so-called 'smoke consumers,' but neither seem to have the slightest effect. It is claimed that while the abolition of soft coal would greatly increase the expenses of railways and manufacturers generally, yet, even from a financial standpoint alone, the city would benefit from it.

There is an alacrity in the measures now adopted in Europe for the relief of Emin Pasha which suggests that they may have an ulterior motive. France, Germany, England and Italy are all in the field for this purpose. The French are aiding M. Solfer, whose primary search is to be for Stanley, while it is also announced that Capt. Treverier has sailed from Bordeaux with an expedition to Equatorial Africa, which is aided by the Government and by M. de Brazza.

The Germans have an Emin Pasha relief committee, which includes several high dignitaries, and is to meet in Wiesbaden September 14. Meanwhile one of its members, Lieut. Wissman, the well-known African traveller, is already on his way to Zanzibar with an expedition which has the direct countenance of the German Government, and which contemplates opening a permanent trade route between the great lakes and the Zanzibar coast.

The London Emin Pasha relief committee has now learned that Major Bartelot, with three other whites and a large force of natives, started from Yambaga early in June with supplies for Stanley, and was well on his way. No doubt the success of Emin and Stanley is to be made the occasion for annexation and commercial enterprises by competing nations; but it is natural that these more selfish interests should also be served while prosecuting the disinterested quest.
