The Republicans have held a father perfunctory convention at Saratoga, as reported elsewhere. There was perfect harmony in its deliberations, however; so much harmony, indeed, that the delegates hardly knew what to do with it—a bewildering and even suspicious surplus of the article.

Their platform, which we have read with some disappointment, is of the old-fashioned kind, dull and tiresome. It is modeled after the pattern used in the time of the Flood. They nominated Warner Miller for Governor and expressed some admiration for a certain Mr. Harrison, though they neglected to answer the familiar question, Who is Harrison, anyhow?

Of course the platform contains a eulogy of the republican policy, so called, but whether it is that of Sherman or that of Blaine or that of Foraker is left to the imagination. It praises all the good things which the party has been promising to do for a generation past, but has not yet done; is in favor—on paper—of an honest ballot, freedom at the polls, a fair count—vide the Hays alleged election—restraint of jobbery—that is, stealing millions of acres of the public domain—and remarks incidentally that it has always regarded public office as a public trust. Other trusts, however, are private affairs.

Of course also it has the periodical whack at the democrats. They are all ghosts, goblins, ghouls, night-mares, vampires. They are bringing the country to the verge of ruin—the people, by the way, hope that the President has a large stock of that kind of ruination on hand—and it can only be saved by the superior and aristocratic elements which are for the republican party right or wrong. In spite of the Saratoga Convention, though, we are looking toward a brilliant, instructive and—for the democratic nominee—a successful campaign.

This is the last Friday half-holiday of the season and as a consequence the city is almost deserted.

For the Excursion. Liberal preparations are being made for the entertainment of those who may attend the grand Masonic excursion to the Rocks and the Forts on the steamer *Sylvan Grove* on Wednesday next. The committee are now at work soliciting contributions for the refreshment tables and the response has thus far been a liberal one.

The G. C. & N. R. R. The Georgia, Carolina and Northern R. R. is being rapidly pushed forward. The gap between Monroe and Chester is nearly finished. There are but eleven miles to build and it is said that the road will be open to Chester by the latter part of next month, in time for the bulk of the cotton crop. This road is one of the Robinson system, known as the Seaboard Air Line, and Maj. John C. Winder has recently been appointed its General Manager. It ought to prove a valuable feeder to Wilmington.

A Disastrous Runaway. At about 7 o'clock this morning Mr. John Branch was driving down Second street with his mustang pony attached to a road cart, when the spring of the cart broke and frightened the animal, causing him to break into a run. He dashed down Second street to Dock, where he fell in the doorway of a vacant store on the corner of Second and Dock and struck his head so violently against the door that his skull was crushed. One of the tendons of his left hind leg was also cut. Fortunately, Mr. Branch received no injuries, but it was a very narrow escape. At last accounts the pony was still alive, although there was a hole in his head through which some of the brain oozed.

A Rival for Jute. Why cannot good cotton bagging be made from pure straw, under the process of the Acme Manufacturing Company? This is the question the above company have undertaken to solve and we trust that they may find a satisfactory answer to it. The pine straw makes a good, durable matting and we do not see why it cannot be converted into bagging. Everybody who has used it knows that it is strong, tough and is almost fire proof, in this last particular possessing a decided advantage over the jute bagging. We have some of it on our office floor and have just torn out a thread and held a blazing match to it. The result was a flame which immediately went out when the match was withdrawn and which left a smouldering coal behind it. It is not easily ignited and if it were possible to mix with it a little asbestos we believe that it could be readily made entirely fire proof. At all events, the Acme Company are now experimenting with the fibre in the belief that they can turn out a durable bagging which will rival the jute both in quality and price, and we trust that they will succeed.

Yesterday's Rowing Race. The fifth regatta of the Recreation Rowing Club, rowed yesterday afternoon over the usual course on the river, was a very interesting event and a hotly contested race. The start was made at 6:15 and the race was witnessed by a large number of spectators. The Nettle, manned by the crew of the Little Joe, came in first and won by just five seconds. The Leona was second and the Little Joe third.

The time was as follows: Nettle, 9 mins. 49 secs.; Leona, 9 mins. 54 secs.; Little Joe, 10 mins. 2 secs. The course was about a mile in length, the start and finish being made from Market street dock. The boats were manned by the following crews:

Willard, third oar; Oscar Watson, stroke; Harry Webb, coxswain. Little Joe—Rob Lewis, bow oar; Harry Bowdoin, second oar; Willie Grant, third oar; Murray Grant, stroke; Edgar Hinton, coxswain.

Gala Week Meeting. A meeting was held at the Orton yesterday, in behalf of a movement for a "gala week" in October next. On motion, Mr. F. W. Kerchner was called to the chair and Mr. T. W. Clawson was requested to act as Secretary. Mr. J. A. Bonitz stated the object of the meeting—to make preparations for a gala week to be held from the 22nd to the 27th of October. He called attention to what might constitute some of the features of the occasion, and urged the advantages that would accrue. He thought the city would make an appropriation, and that funds to the amount of \$2,000 or more could be easily raised by subscription.

Mr. S. H. Fishplate endorsed the movement and expressed his belief, as a member of the Board of Aldermen, that the city would make a subscription of \$500 or \$1,000. Mr. W. A. Bryan advocated the movement, and Mr. Kerchner also approved of it. The meeting resolved to go on with preparations for a gala week, and on motion organized itself into the Wilmington Gala Week Association; the officers to consist of a President, five Vice Presidents, a Secretary and a Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer.

On motion, an election was gone into for these officers and the following were chosen: President—F. W. Kerchner. Vice Presidents—Chas. M. Steadman, John J. Fowler, S. H. Fishplate, H. Walters and J. N. Sebrrell. Secretary—J. C. Morrison. Corresponding Secretary—Walker Taylor. Treasurer—H. G. Smallbones.

On motion, the chairman appointed a committee on advertising, as follows: W. A. Bryan, chairman; T. M. Emerson, W. H. Bernard, Josh T. James, J. A. Bonitz. A motion was also adopted that a committee be appointed, to consist of the President and Vice Presidents, to go before the Board at their meeting on Monday, and request that an appropriation be made in aid of the gala week, and to urge the Board to take some action with regard to protecting the railroads from ticket scalpers, so that the roads giving low rates can be guaranteed against loss.

The committees were instructed to be ready to report on Thursday next, until which day at 11 o'clock a. m., the meeting adjourned. The city papers were requested to publish the proceedings of the meeting.
