Such is the combination of great railroad corporations that worked harmoniously together to give the Republican party a candidate for the Presidency. It has been estimated by the Chicago Tribune that this combination represented a capital of upward of a thousand million of dollars. With such an enormous weight thrown into the scale, the candidates to whom the railroad corporations were hostile or indifferent kicked the beam one after the other. The Tribune has been constrained by the spirit of party to give its support to a ticket nominated under such auspices. But the facts it has educed and the reasons which it has given for voting against the Republican candidate cannot fail to exert a powerful influence over the independent voters of Illinois and other portions of the Northwest.







Following is the full text of the famous letter written by Senator John J. Ingalls (Judge Advocate of the Kansas militia while in the late war) during the recent Republican Convention at Chicago. It was addressed to a member of the Kansas delegation, and is destined to play almost as distinguished a part in this campaign as Bro. Burchard's famous alliterative allegation('Rum, Romanism and Rebellion") did in 1884:

VICE-PRESIDENT'S CHAMBER, WASHINGTON, June 16.5

Yours 13th at hand. It does not make much difference who is nominated in my judgment. The candi-dates will cut but a small figure in the fight. We can elect anybody or we shall fail. The least conspicu-ous, and therefore the least compli-cated man, will be the best. Somebody like Hayes in 1876.

Among the men named there is not one "leader." No one whose personal or historical relations to the people would make a difference of 1,000 votes in the canvass. Sherman, Allison, Harrison, etc., have records that would be awkward on the tariff, the currency, the Chinese question, etc. Depew's connection with railroads and corporations would be a heavy load, especially in the agricultural States. We might as well nominate Gould or Vander bilt at once. My impression is that Alger or Gresham come nearer fill-ing the bill than any of the others, with some fellow like Phelps, of New Jersey, who could reach the conservative forces of the East and tuition reduced to \$30 a half year.
