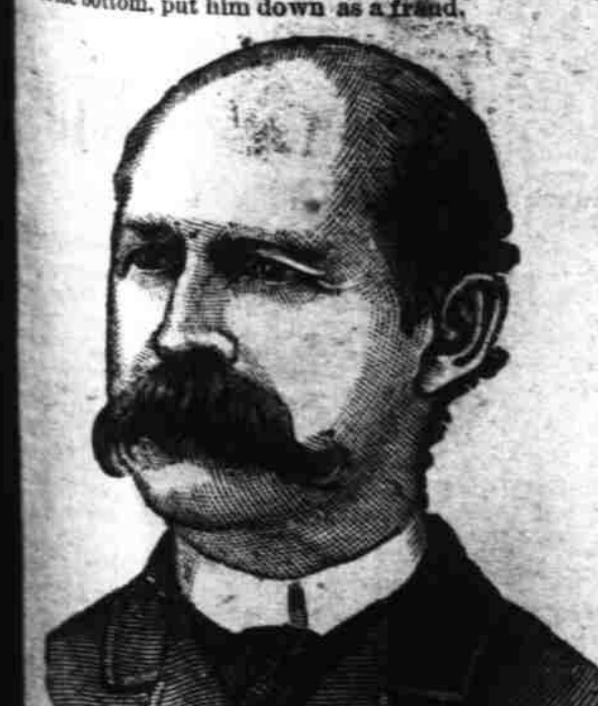

A Substitute for Jute.

South Carolina now has a word to say on the question of a substitute for jute bagging. A dispatch from Columbia says that "Capt. J. A. Peterken, the great cotton planter, living at Fort Motte, near Columbia has solved the problem that has been agitating cotton planters since the formation of the jute trust. He has ordered extensive machinery for the purpose of making wood bagging for cotton to take the place of jute. The bagging can be made of sweet gum, elm, or any swamp wood, and will be of veneer one-eighth of an inch thick. When this is used, the cotton will be thoroughly boxed and not liable to catch fire. The stuff can be taken green from the log and will not injure the cotton. He will be able to make 200,000 feet a day, and furnish it at five cents per yard. He predicts that in a short time everybody who owns a gin will be able to rip out his own bagging at small cost. Capt. Peterken is the man after whom the famous Peterken cotton seed, so well known in this section, were named."

This all sounds very well on paper but we do not believe that wood will answer. If cut out thin enough to remove the objections as to weight it will be sure to split and go to pieces in splinters. In other words, as it appears to us, the wood covering will not bear handling. On the contrary, the Acme pine fibre has been thoroughly tested in the compress and has stood the test and we believe that this is the only material that can be made to antagonize the jute. In one respect it is even better than the jute, because it is to a great extent impervious to fire. The thin wood, when dry, would ignite almost as readily as the cotton itself.

The merchants in Charleston are taking a great deal of interest in the pine fibre bagging. Yesterday's *News and Courier* has a lengthy article on the subject, repeating what it published something more than two years ago relative to the process of manufacturing pure fibre matting at the Acme Manufacturing Company Works at Cronly. The gist of opinion among those interested in the matter in Charleston is that the fibre matting can be made a success and can next year be made a formidable and successful rival to the jute bagging.
