

A Peterken, the great cotton planter, living at Fort Motte, near Columbia has solved the problem that has been agitating cotton planters since the formation of the jute trust, He has ordered extensive machinery for the purpose of making wood bag ging for cotton to take the place of be given to Southport and the Forts jute. The bagging can be made of sweet gum, elm, or any swamp weod, and will be of veneer oneeigth of on inch thick, When this is used, the cotton will be theroughhave attended several of the series by boxed and not liable to catch fire.
